#### Pastor's Message for April 2019

#### From the Cross to the Empty Tomb

The world rose up against Jesus to destroy the goodness of the God's Kingdom. Evil did not want to lose the gains it had achieved through the temptations it had presented to the Caesar in Rome.

After forty days in the wilderness without food, Jesus was famished. He had been tested by Satan for all those days and now while Jesus was at his weakest, Satan challenged him to show his power by turning stones into loaves of bread to satisfy his hunger. Satan tempted Jesus to bow down to him and receive all he wanted without suffering. Satan then tempted Jesus to throw himself from the highest point of the Temple in order to prove God's love to protect him.

Later Jesus would be tempted by men who were friends and others who were enemies. But throughout all of these Jesus would never betray God the Father or you, his creation.

During this Lenten season we have met each Wednesday to

sing the Holden Evening Prayer and hear a series of lessons based on the 'Signs of Lent' which were Stop, Merge, Yield, One-Way and Dead-End. Jesus could not be tempted to Stop, Jesus merged the lamb's blood that saved the Hebrews during Passover with his own blood that saved us all, Jesus came to earth to yield, to obey his Father's will, to carry out his Father's plan for our salvation, Jesus is the one-way and only way to be redeemed, Jesus leads us out of the dead-end of sin producing death and leads us to the Cross where we are given eternal life.

We will share a last meal together with Jesus on the evening of Maundy Thursday and then weep at his death on Good Friday. But three days later we will Rejoice in Joy at the discovery of an empty tomb and our Risen Lord Jesus. This month has brought us from death to life, sorrow to joy, sin to forgiveness and death to life. Never stop, always merge, always yield, stay on the one-way and return from the dead end to follow the way to the cross in Jesus.

## Ask the Pastor

Question: Hebrews 13:2 " Remember to welcome strangers in your homes. There are some who did that and welcomed angels without knowing it". Also there is the famous encounter with angels and Sarah and Abraham. I have long wondered if those meetings still happen in today's world. How would we know? I have friends who sometimes mention something was a "God thing" and maybe that is an "angel thing." With the world as it is today, do angels still visit, inform and lead us? **Answer:** "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?" 1 Cor 3:16. If we believe God himself dwells within us, why would we not believe God sends Angels to us? The picture on the left is called "Heilige Schutzengel" in German by the artist Lindberg. It hung on the wall outside my bedroom from the time I was born. My first memory of it was at about age three. I would stop in the hallway and stare at it and find comfort and peace. This same framed picture from that wall now hangs in our home at the Parsonage.

God sent angels to bring messages to humans. The most famous is the angel Gabriel who visited Daniel, Zechariah and the Virgin Mary. An angel then visited Joseph to let him know his betrothed Mary would be having a baby conceived from the Holy Spirit.

Angels visited Abraham and then went on to visit his nephew Lot. An angel visited the parents of Samson and they did not know he was an angel.

Jesus said, "Do you think that I cannot appeal to my Father, and he will at once send me more than twelve legions of angels?"

Mary Magdalene saw two Angels when she looked in the empty tomb of Jesus. There are many scriptures in the Bible that tells of Angels interacting with humans.

Do Angels still visit us? I believe so and that brings me comfort and peace as well as a desire to treat any stranger I meet as if they were an angel.

Jesus says the second greatest commandment is to love your neighbor as yourself. How much easier would that be if we treated each stranger as if they were an angel? You never know, the person you treat as an angel may very well be God's messenger come to give you a message.

#### St. Paul's ELCA Church, Lohman, Missouri Regular Congregational Council Meeting, March 11, 2019

A regular Congregational Council meeting was called to order at 6:30pm, on Monday, March 11, 2019 at 6:30 pm by President Zola Finch.

Election of Becky Weber for Church Council Secretary was the first order of business. A motion was made by Mitch Plochberger, seconded by Laurie Koestner, and passed via voice vote. Present were council members Delores Vlach, Paula Linsenbardt, Kathy Meller, Mitchell Plochberger, Laurie Koestner, and Becky Weber. Absent was Dan Tschirgi and Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe. Also present was Pastor David Viles.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Pastor Viles, who then led the group in a brief devotion on Ephesians 5: 10,17. As Christians, we ask "Why am I here?" or "What is God's will for my life?" We seek God's will for direction. God's will is never about personal gain, but rather our relationship first with God, and then with others in our church and community. We are wise to seek ways to be closer to Him, and to help others do so as well.

The President then called for a motion to approve the minutes of the February 11, 2019 Council Meeting. The motion was offered by Kathy, seconded by Paula, and passed via voice vote.

The President offered the Council Treasurer's report for review of the past month's expenses and incomes. The two-page financial report was presented and accepted.

The President then asked Pastor Viles for the February mileage and activity report. Pastor's February mileage totaled 170 miles. A motion to approve this was passed upon a motion by Laurie, and seconded by Paula, and passed via voice vote. The amount is \$98.60. Pastor reported attendance at several individual meetings and activities. He made 2 home visits, 2 hospital visits, 4 office visits, and various conversations.

The President called for Standing Committee reports:

The President then called for discussion of Old Business. Zola will ask Dan if he can build shelves in choir closet. Laurie suggested clean out, purge, or donate existing choir robes that are no longer in use.

Kathy suggested older sheet music be put on table downstairs for anyone to take, in order to free up needed file cabinet space.

Mitch said water softener needs to be brought outside and cleaned out, bleached and brought back in. He will try to do this weekend. Mitch reports he and his committee suggested new outside lighting, and a possible need to run electricity on outside of building that faces parsonage, with better light between church and parsonage. Gary Elliott solicited bids replacing glass doors on front of church for improved security but this was tabled.

Pastor asked Mitch for maintenance/work schedule in event someone needs to fill in, to include fire alarm, smoke detectors, water softener and furnace filters. Mitch to email church secretary and Pastor the information on church workday.

Zola reported on Project Graduation. A free will offering box will be put in the church narthex. Zola contacted RACS for more information on RACS annual walk but has not heard back. Zola reports on donation request for donation to Habitat, and will give this request to Erika Gerth. Zola gave Pastor checklist pertaining to church legalities.

Pastor reported on donation request by Melissa Penberthy for Annual Community Easter Egg Hunt. Pastor offered motion to approve \$50.00 donation, seconded by Mitch and passed via voice vote. Pastor reported on a \$1,000.00 donation from Adam Weber who requested it be given to cemetery and playground upkeep. After discussion, Pastor made motion to split donation, \$500.00 be used for cemetery fund and \$500.00 for upkeep on outdoor playground. Pastor reported Kathryn Linsenbardt noted front benches need to be replaced or repaired. Under New Business: Zola will make Inclement Weather policy defining steps to be taken when church must be cancelled. Policy will include possible Saturday service in event Sunday service cancelled due to bad weather.

Council was adjourned at 8:40pm. The Lord's Prayer was recited by all.

There was no formal technology report in Dan's absence. Comments were made on how much better the sound system is working and the clarity of the new microphone for Pastor Viles.

#### Worship & Music: Kathy Meller

The worship and music committee met on Tuesday, March 5, 2019. We were excited to report that church attendance is up, averaging over 100 in attendance each Sunday. Since this year inclement weather has affected Sunday services, we discussed the possibility of implementing an Inclement Weather Policy. Possible scenarios would be to have church on Saturday evening or on Sunday afternoon depending on the weather forecast. This will be discussed at the Church Council meeting. Several special services will be held at St. Paul's. Ash Wednesday with communion and imposition of

ashes will be held on March 6.

Midweek Lenten services will begin on March 13 and continue through April 10. A social time will begin at 6:30p.m. with cookies and drinks, followed by services at 7:00p.m. The theme for the services will be Road Signs for Lent. Holden Evening Prayer will be used for the music. Preliminary plans for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter were discussed and will be finalized at the April meeting.

Hymns were selected for Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Sundays in April. The committee decided there would be no hymn of the month. Setting 3 will be used through Easter. Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 2, 2019.

## Parish Education: Laurie Koestner

Laurie ordered new Sunday School material, and reported on thank you letters from Halo House for the suitcases, and Becky Hayden for Food Pantry donations, and Super Bowl Sunday donations. Junior Lutherans and Sunday School members made Valentines and delivered them to area nursing homes.

#### Church Improvement: Mitchell Plochberger

Presented a bid from Woodman Engineering on new air conditioning project. After much discussion, a motion was presented by Laurie to accept the bid as presented, and seconded by Kathy. Mitch to check with Woodman on possible purchase of additional warranty.

The kitchen renovation project was discussed. Funds for such will come from WELCA, Church Improvement, fundraisers and individual donations. Zola asked for names of contractors, Mitch will get names. Discussion was tabled until future council meeting.

Door replacements were discussed, to include the side wood doors facing parsonage, at landing going down to church basement, and the outside wood door behind altar. Possible redo of choir robe closet and update on outside lighting was discussed.

**Spring work day set for April 6, 2019 at 8:00 a.m.** We will need additional help on our Spring work day this year. In addition to the normal maintenance of the grounds such as limb pick-up and removal, leaves and sweet-gum ball removal and flower beds, we also plan to clean out the Storage Garage, the Choir Robe closet and Turn the Bells in the Bell Tower. All volunteers are greatly appreciated.

# Reading Through the Bible

These readers have been amazing in their dedication and participation in discussions when we meet as a group each Sunday. The questions are fantastic and learning is so much fun when done together.

## Some of what we have learned so far.

While Moses was on Mount Sinai receiving the two tablets inscribed by the finger of God, the Israelites were at the foot of the mountain breaking every command written in stone.

Many foods were considered 'unclean' and could not be eaten. No shrimp or lobster. No bacon or pork of any kind. No catfish! No blood or fat, so you must not eat a fat rare steak. It's a good thing we are Christians living in Missouri.

Moses, who spent forty years leading the people around the wilderness was told to speak to a rock in God's name and it would pour forth water for the people. Moses struck the rock with his staff the way he was told to do the time before and because of this he was punished by not being allowed to go into the new land of Milk and Honey. That is so sad...

A Donkey speaks and saves the life of Balaam, his master.

Numbers 33 gives a place by place account of where the Israelites camped in the wilderness during their 40 years. Did you know it was only 39 years and 8 months? But whose counting?
