
Remember you are blessed by God's grace and love. You were blessed this summer with a time for rest and a time to spend with

Ask the Pastor

Question: Each Sunday we say a Creed, normally the Apostles' Creed but sometimes the Nicene Creed. Who wrote them? When were they written? Where were they written? Do most denominations use these creeds? Perhaps you could do a creed a month?

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary

and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,

and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified,

who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

Amen.

Answer: Great question and suggestion of learning about the Creeds each month.

This week we will look at the second most common Creed used in the church, the Nicene Creed.

In 325 AD, the church was being fractured by different theological understandings that went against the Christian faith.

On the one side was the belief taught by Athanasius that we hold true in our faith today which says God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are ONE. Three persons but ONE God.

On the other side was the belief of Arius, who was a leader of a congregation in Alexandria, Egypt. He taught that Jesus was God's Son but was different from the Father and subordinate to the Father. The Son was God but the Father and Son were not ONE. These two different teachings were splitting the church between the separate factions.

Constantine the Great was a Roman emperor who was the first emperor to convert to Christianity. Due to the ongoing fracture of the church, Constantine interceded to put an end to the feud between the two opposing factions. Constantine said, "Division in the church is worse than war."

In 325 he called together a gathering of the First Council of Nicaea. Constantine invited 1,800 bishops to come to Nicaea (present day Iznik, Turkey) and discuss this theological issue and settle the truth of the matter.

Around 300 bishops attended the council gathering at Nicaea and after much discussion agreed upon the newly written creed which would be named after the gathering called by Constantine in Nicaea.

This Nicene Creed would refute the Arian belief and condemn Arius as a heretic and he would be exiled.

These are the beliefs we have come to have faith in through hearing the Word of God in the Holy Scriptures. We believe Jesus to be fully God and fully human. Jesus is "God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father". Amen

St. Athanasius wrote a book called "On the Incarnation". If you would like to borrow my copy to read, let me know.

St. Paul's Bible Scholars meet each Sunday at 4:00 p.m. Last month we completed Job and started reading the book of Psalms.

← New Schedule for the Month.

Some of what we have learned these 4 weeks.

The book of Job was a difficult story to read. Why should good people suffer? We know we are not perfect but even when we try to do the best we can, often suffering and sorrow enter our lives.

Job teaches us when we remain faithful in God's presence and help we are lead through these difficult situations as God sees us to the end.

In Job's story he is restored with all he lost and more and is assured that God never left him.

In our life we sometimes lose what we love and may not get it back or at least not in the way we wish. But we can be assured that when we come face to face with God we will gain what we could never have hoped for on this earth.

As of the end of July we will have read 119 of the 150 Psalms. The shortest read on July 30 was only two verses containing a mere 29 words in the NIV. Two chapters later we read 119 on July 31 which is the longest Psalm with 176 verses containing 2,320 words.

The Psalms are the songs of the Jews which are sung to the praise of God. They recount times of joy, trouble and despair. They point to God's faithfulness in his love and caring for us. They tell of our dependence on God alone and the many ways we are saved through his grace.

If you are not reading through the Bible, please consider reading one Psalm a day in the morning or the evening for the next 150 days and contemplate on what speaks to you from this poetic writing.
