
children. One of the best known comes from Proverbs 22:6 which states, "Train children in the right way, and when old, they will not stray."

Ask the Pastor

Question: Each Sunday we say one of three Creeds. Apostles', Nicene or Athanasian Creed.

Who wrote them? When and where were they written? Perhaps you could do a creed a month?

Answer: Great question and suggestion of learning about the Creeds each month.

This month we will conclude our creed study with the least used; Athanasian Creed.

Originally believed to have been written by Saint Athanasius of Alexandria in the fourth century, scholars now are convinced it was written in the fifth or sixth century in southern Gaul, now known as France, by an as yet unknown author.

The purpose for this creed is to state, once and for all, a complete and comprehensive affirmation of our faith regarding the Holy Trinity, one God in three persons. This creed comes as close as possible in our understanding of how our triune God is one alone.

Perhaps the reason we don't use it in our worship service is due to the length which would require we cut out the sermon and two hymns. Just joking.

Athanasian Creed

Whoever wants to be saved should above all cling to the catholic faith. Whoever does not guard it whole and inviolable will doubtless perish eternally. Now this is the catholic faith: We worship one God in trinity and the Trinity in unity, neither confusing the persons nor dividing the divine being. For the Father is one person, the Son is another, and the Spirit is still another. But the deity of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit is one, equal in glory, coeternal in majesty. What the Father is, the Son is, and so is the Holy Spirit. Uncreated is the Father; uncreated is the Son; uncreated is the Spirit. The Father is infinite; the Son is infinite; the Holy Spirit is infinite. Eternal is the Father; eternal is the Son; eternal is the Spirit: And yet there are not three eternal beings, but one who is eternal; as there are not three uncreated and unlimited beings, but one who is uncreated and unlimited. Almighty is the Father; almighty is the Son; almighty is the Spirit: And yet there are not three almighty beings, but one who is almighty. Thus the Father is God; the Son is God; the Holy Spirit is God: And yet there are not three gods, but one God. Thus the Father is Lord; the Son is Lord; the Holy Spirit is Lord: And yet there are not three lords, but one Lord. As Christian truth compels us to acknowledge each distinct person as God and Lord, so catholic religion forbids us to say that there are three gods or lords. The Father was neither made nor created nor begotten; the Son was neither made nor created, but was alone begotten of the Father; the Spirit was neither made nor created, but is proceeding from the Father and the Son. Thus there is one Father, not three fathers; one Son, not three sons; one Holy Spirit, not three spirits. And in this Trinity, no one is before or after, greater or less than the other; but all three persons are in themselves, coeternal and coequal; and so we must worship the Trinity in unity and the one God in three persons. Whoever wants to be saved should think thus about the Trinity. It is necessary for eternal salvation that one also faithfully believe that our Lord Jesus became flesh. For this is the true faith that we believe and confess: That our Lord Jesus Christ, God's Son, is both God and man. He is God, begotten before all worlds from the being of the Father, and he is man, born in the world from the being of his mother—existing fully as God, and fully as man with a rational soul and a human body; equal to the Father in divinity, subordinate to the Father in humanity. Although he is God and man, he is not divided, but is one Christ. He is united because God has taken humanity into himself; he does not transform deity into humanity. He is completely one in the unity of his person, without confusing his natures. For as the rational soul and body are one person, so the one Christ is God and man. He suffered death for our salvation. He descended into hell and rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. At his coming all people shall rise bodily to give an account of their own deeds. Those who have done good will enter eternal life, those who have done evil will enter eternal fire. This is the catholic faith. One cannot be saved without believing this firmly and faithfully.



Congregational Council Meeting, August 12, 2019

A regular Congregational Council meeting was called to order at 6:40pm, on Monday, August 12, 2019 by President Zola Finch. Present were council members Delores Vlach, Kathy Meller, Laurie Koestner, and Becky Weber. Mitch Plochberger arrived after the opening and prayer. Absent were Paula Linsenbardt, and Dan Tschirgi. Also present were Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe and Pastor David Viles.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Pastor Viles, who then led the group in a devotion based on Luke 12:25, on how we as Christians, can be dressed for action and have our lamps lit. We can tell when our police officers, firefighters and military members are dressed for action. We as Christians, can also be ready by remaining alert to those in need of hearing about Christ, and in need of a church home.

The President then called for a motion to approve the minutes of the June 2019 Council Meeting, and a single action voted on by Council in July, 2019, which was the approval of payment for June mileage for Pastor Viles. The President called upon Council Treasurer to present a review of the past month's expenses and incomes. A two-page review was presented and accepted. After discussion to pay Samaritan Center \$500.00, a motion was offered by Kathy, seconded by Laurie and passed via voice vote.

President then asked Pastor Viles for the mileage and activity report. Pastor's July mileage totaled 95 miles at \$55.10. A motion to approve this was offered by Mitchell, seconded by Delores, and passed via voice vote.

Pastor reported attendance at many meetings to include Lions Club, Food Bank at Trinity in Russellville, Lohman City Council, Church Council, Weekly adult forums, Weekly bible study classes, and a pre wedding discussion meeting. He made 4 home visits, 5 phone consults, 1 office visit, officiated at 1 wedding, performed 2 communion and 2 non-communion services at St. Paul's, and 1 home communion service.

The President then called for Standing Committee reports which are included below.

The President then called for discussion of Old Business. The fire drill on July 28, 2019 was discussed and it was agreed we need to evacuate the building in a more timely manner, and that people do not leave in their cars during the drill. Another drill will take place at a later time.

← New Schedule for the Month.

Some of what we have learned the past 4 weeks.

We finished the last 40 chapters of Psalms. This was a nice change from some of what we had been reading in the past that was repetitious and not quite what we were used to hearing about God. Poetry to God is always good.

Then we moved into the book of Proverbs. These were interesting and kind of fun. Mostly one or two liners about wisdom as handed down from a parent to a child. Most of them were very good with teaching against foolishness and peer pressure. Teaching of good work ethics and doing what is right in life. Others seemed almost silly, like 11:22 ""Like a gold ring in a pig's snout is a beautiful woman who shows no discretion."

The book of Ecclesiastes taught us "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven" but everything we do is just a "chasing after the wind". Rich and poor alike end up the same, dead. All is vanity, "There is nothing better for mortals than to eat and drink, and find enjoyment in their toil."

Our next book was Song of Songs, Oh My! That was a little unexpected. You may not want your children to read this until they are adults. Yes, it is a little racy and talks of great desire and love. But, it is important to remember just how much God loves us and that he will do anything to keep us, even if it means dying for us on a cross. The descriptions can be a little strange such as the man describing his lovely lady, "Your hair is like a flock of goats, moving down the slopes of Gilead. Your teeth are like a flock of shorn ewes that have come up from the washing." Hmm, I'm not sure how romantic that really sounds, especially in our day and time...

We ended the month about two thirds through the book

of Isaiah. This prophet pronounces God's judgement on Judah, Jerusalem and the surrounding nations but also promises the restoration after their exile. This seems to have been one of Jesus' favorite books as he quotes from it often.
