"Carrying his own cross, [Jesus] went out to the place of the Skull. < John 19:17>

"A young man was at the end of his rope. Seeing no way out, he dropped to his knees in prayer. "Lord, I can't go on," he said, "I have too heavy of a cross to bear." The Lord replied, "My son, if you can't bear its weight, just place your cross inside this room. Then, open that other door and pick out any cross you wish." When we focus on our self, even the most trivial of things can cause us to feel hopeless and anxious. But when we look around at the world around us and take note of the great despair that afflicts masses of people who have little to no hope we can find comfort in the size of the cross we bear.

God does not give you a cross of any size, but God knows you will receive one from the sinful world in

which we live. God carried his own cross the world gave to him, and God is always present to help you carry the one you have. God sends us to also help others carry the cross they are given. By this we are called his disciples.

Ask the Pastor

Question: The ELCA became the first Christian Sanctuary Church in America, what does this mean?

Answer: As we consider our response to being a sanctuary church, we turn to God's Word in the Bible: "So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. <Gen 1:27> and "'When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt." <Leviticus 19:33-34>

We are called by God to treat and love each other as brothers and sisters, all of us created the same by God in his own image. No matter who we are, where we come from, or what we look like, we are a child of God and loved the same by Father in Heaven. Too often, the people of the world look at others who are different from themselves as being less important and sometimes even less human. But this is not the way of God, this is not what Jesus taught.

So what does it mean to be a 'Sanctuary Church' in the ELCA? It means we are to follow the teachings of our Father in Heaven, our Savior Jesus the Christ as we are guided by the Holy Spirit. It means that answering God's call to walk alongside the immigrant is a declaration of our faith to walk alongside Jesus. It does not mean breaking the law or engaging in partisan politics.

Each 'Congregation' in each 'Synod' will determine for itself to what extent it will follow God's teachings. What are some options?

- + Support the work of other congregations and organizations who work directly with immigrants.
- + Actively invite and welcome all to worship, regardless of immigration status.
- + Provide legal and other kinds of support to asylum seekers, undocumented and other immigrants as they pursue their legally protected rights through the courts.
- + Some congregations are involved in advocating and working for change in local and national immigration policies.
- + Other congregations may choose to provide housing or shelter for undocumented persons.
 - However, the background information for the memorial reminds that "activities such as knowingly concealing, harboring or shielding (or attempting to conceal, harbor or shield) an undocumented immigrant from detection by the authorities are not (legal). Likewise, knowingly transporting or moving (or attempting to transport or move) an undocumented immigrant from one place to another, where the transportation helps the immigrant remain in the United States unlawfully, is illegal."

There is nothing in the memorial that calls for civil disobedience or any illegal actions.
Prayer is also actively needed for the sake of immigrants. But don't be surprised if God gives you the tools to do His Work, with Your Hands when you pray as a disciple of Christ.

Congregational Council Meeting, September 9, 2019

A regular Congregational Council Meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm on Monday, September 9, 2019, by President Zola Finch. Present were council members Delores Vlach, Kathy Meller, Paula Linsenbardt, Mitch Plochberger and Becky Weber. Absent were Laurie Koestner and Dan Tschirgi. Also present were Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe and Pastor David Viles.

The meeting was opened by Pastor Viles, who led the group in a prayer and a devotion on St. Paul. We are here to serve God in a spirit of wisdom and revelation. We are to live in the light. We must not live in fear of scarcity.

President Finch then called for a motion to approve the minutes of the August 2019 Council Meeting. The motion was offered by Kathy, and seconded by Paula, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch called upon the Council Treasurer to present a review of the past month's expenses and income. A two-page review was presented by Kay. Zola reports she has applied for a Spark Visa card with a \$30,000.00 credit line for convenient use. A motion to approve the Treasurer report was offered by Delores and seconded by Mitch and passed via voice vote. President Finch then asked Pastor for the August 2019 mileage and activity report. August mileage totaled 219 miles. A motion to approve this was offered by Mitch, seconded by Paula, and passed via voice vote. The amount is \$127.02. Pastor reported attending seven meetings, to include Ministerial Alliance, Lion's Club, Area 9 Leaders Meeting in Cole Camp, Church Council, Lohman City Council, Mutual Ministry, and Safety – Security. He reported numerous office and home visits, and various conversations. Pastor conducted weekly Adult Forum classes, weekly Bible Study Group, one wedding rehearsal and wedding, hung posters and placed advertising material for Lifetouch Directory, helped City Council members sort and repair Christmas lights to be hung in town during the Christmas season, worked at Trinity Food Bank, attended the Teacher Workshop with the Ministerial alliance and created and sent out the September Epistle. President Finch suggested having a back- up person to do the Epistle in the event Pastor is unable to do this. Pastor will work on this. Pastor conducted two communion and two non-communion services at St. Paul's.

The President then called for Standing Committee reports which are included below.

The President then called for discussion of Old Business. President reports David Finch and Rich Prosch will serve as new co-chairs for the Safety-Security Council.

The Lifetouch directory appointments are almost full, and new openings will be made. In the event someone cannot attend, Pastor offered to take one with his camera and submit it to Lifetouch.

Bill and Erika Gerth will continue publishing the annual directories with important information not listed in the new directory.

New Business: Mitch reports the air conditioner is being set to improve comfort for services. He also reports one Sanctuary drop light needs repairs.

A motion to adjourn was offered by Mitch, seconded by Paula, and passed via voice vote. Council was adjourned at 8:25 pm and closed with the Lord's prayer.

Worship & Music: Kathy Meller

Worship and Music (Kathy Meller) – The worship and music committee met on Tuesday, September 3, 2019 at 9:00 a.m. Committee members expressed that they were glad fall is on the way and that it will be nice to see our youth and choir get back into a normal routine. With the start of fall it will be a busy time. Beginning in September, we will use Setting 10 during our church service. On non-communion Sundays we will use "Glory Be to God" and on communion Sundays we will use "Come Let Us Join" during the liturgy.

The choir will begin sharing special music on September 15th. This will also be the start of Sunday school and confirmation. Sunday school teachers will be installed during worship service. Moving on to the month of October, the committee selected hymns and selected a Hymn of the Month: #612 Healer of Our Every III. It was also decided that during communion, soft music will be played on the organ instead of congregational singing to set more of a meditative mood during this time. Reformation Sunday will be October 27th and the congregation is asked to wear red.

← New Schedule for the Month.

Some of what we have learned the past 4 weeks.

We finished Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations and we are happy to be through them. Isaiah and Jeremiah were all about the wickedness of the Northern Israel and Southern Judah. They warned the people over and over that if they didn't act better they would be exiled to Babylon. Well they didn't straighten up and true to God's word they were captured and sent to Babylon.

It seems like it is a vicious cycle and they never learn. Oh wait, that sounds a little like people today. I guess some things just never change. But both Isaiah and Jeremiah told the people that even though they would be punished, God still loved them and there was hope. God would never completely let them be destroyed. And that is the message of hope we still have today. We are not the best we could be but we are still loved, so much that God sends his Son, Jesus the Christ to be our Savior.

Perhaps this is why Isaiah is one of the most quoted books by Jesus. He knows we need to be told over and over and sometimes we cause ourselves a lot of misery, but we are never alone and we are always loved.

Lamentations is a book also written by Jeremiah and it is full of the pain of injustice and human loss. It follows the destruction of Jerusalem and the exile of the people to Babylon. It is filled with raw emotions of anger, desperation, fear, loneliness and helplessness. It is a book that helps us and those who have been wounded feel a kindred and perhaps an understanding. Reading Lamentations also helps us see a light within the darkness and gives us hope that even when we are at the bottom of the well, it is not the end.

We finished the month by beginning to read Ezekiel and made it two thirds of the way though by the end of the

month. This book continues in much the same way as Isaiah and Jeremiah but something strange is going on. There are many bizarre visions and tricky revelations that are difficult to understand and we are just hopeful to make it through. Thank goodness we have Pastor to encourage us and help us through these readings.

But it won't be too long before we finish the Old Testament and move into something new and hopefully easier to understand.

Thanks to everyone who has persevered through these difficult readings, after this month's wild ride I think we can look forward to it only getting better.
