

## **Pastor's Message**

"We wait in hope for the Lord; he is our help and our shield. In him our hearts rejoice, for we trust in his holy name. May your unfailing love be with us, Lord, even as we put our hope in you."

### <Psalm 33:20-22>

The psalmist writes, "We wait in hope for the Lord." But we are also pulled in another direction from the world in which we live.

Sunday, February 2, 2020 is the 54th Super Bowl and the 50th modern-era National Football League (NFL) championship game. The Kansas City Chiefs have played in the Super Bowl only twice before this Sunday. They lost to the Green Bay Packers in the very first Super Bowl on January 15, 1967 and then won their second time to play 50 years ago against the Minnesota Vikings on January 11, 1970.

Before the last two games the KC Chiefs played, I gave a small blessing after our worship and they did win and have gone on to the Super Bowl. Those blessings were free, but this Sunday is

## Ask the Pastor

Question: Why do we celebrate Ash Wednesday and when did that tradition start?

#### Answer:

*"When Jesus heard that John had been put in prison, he withdrew to Galilee...From that time on Jesus began to preach, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."" <Matthew 4:12, 17>* 

Jesus speaks of repentance often just as John the Baptist did before him to make way for the Lord. This is a foundation of turning away from the world and turning toward God. We know that nothing we can do on our own can make us holy or give us salvation. Christ on the Cross and Risen did that for us. But that doesn't mean we can sin boldly as the Apostle Paul said. Jesus commands us to repent of our sins and that is something we should do daily and together on Sunday morning together.

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent for the Church and brings our focus on this repentance and prayer through personal and communal confession.

Ash Wednesday is a 40 day season that always begins 46 days before Easter Sunday. During those 46 days there are 6 Sundays which are not counted as days of Lent. Every Sunday is a mini-Easter. This is why Lent is counted as 40 days and those days reflect the time Jesus spent in the wilderness after his Baptism by John. Jesus fasted during this time and was tempted by Satan. Likewise this is a time for us to do without and focus on Christ's life, ministry, death and resurrection.



During our worship service of Ash Wednesday, which will be February 26<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m., those who wish will come forward to receive the sign of the cross in ashes on their forehead or hand. When the ashen cross is given you will hear these or similar words, "From dust you came and from dust you will return." These ashes symbolize two main things: death and repentance. "Ashes are equivalent to dust, and human flesh is composed of dust as we read in <Genesis 2:7>, and when a human body decomposes,

it returns to dust or ash." When you come forward to receive this sign you are committing and act of repentance for the sins you have done and you are dedicating the following 40 days to restore your hearts of holiness and seek to do God's will and prepare yourself for the celebration of Easter Sunday. These days are a solemn time of prayer and reflection to focus our attention on the life we lead and the life God would have us lead.

Some church traditions require the abstinence of certain foods and drinks or fasting all day and having only one meal in the evening. This is to remind us of Jesus 40 day fast in the wilderness and also to focus our attention on giving up the temptations of the world and receiving the gifts of God.

While I think this is a wonderful tradition I recommend you give up a favorite food, drink, special event, or anything you enjoy for the 40 days and replace it with an act of kindness or giving each day of the season. This will help you focus on giving up the temptations of life and lead you to do God's will.

The history of Ash Wednesday's beginning is not exactly known, but it is believed that it was started in the early church during the time of Jesus' Apostles. But we know that the worship was formalized at the First Council of Nicaea in 325 AD. Most scholars believe by the end of the fourth century the fortyday period of Lent was a standard period of the worship season that included fasting and prayer as part of its primary means of repentance and preparation for the holy day of Easter.

Since the date of Ash Wednesday is dependent on the day of Easter, how is Easter calculated? Easter falls on the first Sunday after the Full Moon that falls on or after the northern hemisphere spring ('vernal') equinox (the paschal full moon). If the Full Moon is on a Sunday, Easter is celebrated on the following Sunday.

## Congregational Council Meeting, January 13, 2020

A regular Congregational Council meeting was called to order at 6:36pm, on Monday, January 13, 2020 by Council President Zola Finch. Present were council members Zola Finch, Laurie Koestner, Delores Vlach, Mitch Plochberger, Kathy Meller and Becky Weber. Absent were Dan Tschirgi and Paula Linsenbardt. Also present were Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe and Pastor David Viles.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Pastor Viles, followed by a devotion from Jeremiah, chapter 29. Pastor talked about where do we go from here, as we enter into a new year. He explained it is not our plans, but instead we are led by God's Spirit to implement the plans God has for us and our congregation.

President Finch called for a motion to approve the minutes of the December 2019 Council Meeting. A motion to approve the December 2019 minutes was offered by Delores Vlach, seconded by Mitch Plochberger, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch called upon Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe, to present a review of the past month's expenses and incomes. A two-page review was presented and accepted. The proposed 2020 annual budget was also reviewed. A motion to accept the past month's expenses and incomes was offered by Mitch Plochberger, seconded by Kathy Meller, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch asked Pastor David Viles for the December 2019 mileage and activity report. Pastor requests that he be allowed to donate his December mileage due to its small amount, council accepted his request.

Pastor reported attendance at several meetings, to include Food Bank at Trinity in Russellville, Church Council, Worship and Music, Mutual Ministry and Lohman City Council. He held Weekly Adult Forums, Weekly Confirmation Classes, and Weekly Bible Study Classes. Pastor also assisted church members with computer files. He participated in Children's Christmas Play, created, emailed and mailed the Epistle for December. He had 3 home visits, 3 office visits, and various conversations. Pastor reports services for December as follows: 7 services at St Paul's. Sunday: 2 communion and 3 non-communion services. Christmas Eve-1 Communion, 2 Home Communion.

President Finch called for the Standing Committee Reports which are included below.

#### Old Business:

Pastor David reports LifeTouch company will mail church directories on January 17, 2020, and the online digital version will be sent within two weeks of that date. After discussion, an offering basket will be placed in the back of church for two Sundays in March for Cole R 1 Russellville's Project Graduation. President Finch presented council members with a map noting a portion of property belonging to our church that crosses over Route D and into part of the front yard of Gert Strobel. After discussion, it was decided we recommend to our congregation that we gift this parcel of land to her. This will be presented to our congregation during the annual meeting.

#### New Business:

David Finch presented recommendations proposed by the Safety and Security committee regarding the 2020 Active Assailant Plan. The recommendations include three areas, in tandem:

\*Address our church perimeter with lights, cameras and improvements to doors.

\*Develop new practices during Sunday worship and other gatherings including the locking of secondary doors and monitoring the front doors and parking lot.

\*Implement a posted "no-firearms' policy for the church except for authorized members of the security team approved by the Pastor in accordance with state law, and who will be required to pass extensive education training. After much discussion, a motion was made to accept the 2020 Active Assailant plan by Becky Weber, seconded by Mitch Plochberger and passed via voice vote.

President Finch commended David Finch and his committee for the time and work involved with this plan, noting that while it is very difficult to acknowledge, our changing times dictate what changes must be put forth to improve our safety here at St. Paul's, these changes must occur and we should all feel much safer with the plan implementation.

After discussion, council decided to implement Time and Talent sheets every other year.

Pastor David listed the following people for consideration as new members to our church family: Beverly Boehm, Roger and Nancy Thompson, Kent and Julie Nelson, and Ashley Heidbreder. A motion to accept these aforementioned people as members to our church was offered by Mitch Plochberger, seconded by Laurie Koestner, and passed via voice vote.

A motion to adjourn was made by Pastor David, seconded by Mitch Plochberger, and passed via voice vote.

Council was adjourned at 8:55pm. The Lord's Prayer was recited by all.

Addendum by Pastor David: I noted that Becky Weber be commended for her visitations and care of Gert Strobel each week. Becky's ministry is especially noteworthy in her attention to devotions she provides during these visits. Thank you, Becky, for the blessings you provide.

### Evangelism: Delores Vlach

Delores and her committee wishes to thank everyone who brought a wonderful selection of cookies, breads and bars to the January fellowship hour. She reported the sign-up sheet for hosting the monthly fellowship hour for 2020 is posted on the narthex bulletin board. Delores reports the committee is considering a menu change for the pancake breakfast set for March, 2020.

### Technology: Dan Tschirgi

Pastor David reports in Dan's absence that Technology is going well. He adds the speakers in the Friendship hall are all working but one, which is being addressed.

### Worship & Music: Kathy Meller

Kathy reports the Advent Dinner was attended by 73 members and friends, with a free will offering collected of \$227.00, used to cover cost of the dinner and decorations. She reports that after the positives and negatives pertaining to the changes we made in 2019, the committee decided to keep the changes in place for 2020 unless some unforeseen circumstance arises. The Children's Christmas program will be the Sunday before Christmas and the Christmas Eve service will be at 6:30pm. Real candles will be used at the conclusion of the service with possibility of having battery operated candles for children. 149 people attended the Children's program and 161 attended Christmas Eve service.

Since Gert Strobel is still recovering and unable to play the organ. Zola Finch and Kathy Meller will continue to fill in as needed.

Pastor David ordered 10 baptismal candles and will check into purchasing handkerchiefs to be used for future baptisms since supplies were depleted. The choir will continue to sing anthems each Sunday. Music will continue to be played during communion in place of singing. The Hymn of the month for February will be #715 Christ, Be Our Light. We will welcome new members to our church on February 23, with cake and punch provided by the committee following church. Ash Wednesday service will be February 26 at 7:00pm. Mid-week Lenten services will be held on March 4, 11, 18, 25 and April 1 downstairs in the Friendship Hall. It was recommended the piano be tuned before these services occur.

#### Parish Education: Laurie Koestner

Laurie reports that all of the comments she received regarding the Children's Christmas program being held the Sunday before Christmas Eve were positive, adding the children seemed happier, more alert and better rested. Plans are being considered to ask adults to tell stories to the Sunday School students that pertain to the Gospel for that Sunday, and incorporating crafts that also go along with that week's Gospel. Monthly Youth Gatherings will start up again this month.

### Church Improvement: Mitchell Plochberger

Mitch reports the following: The lectern receptacle replaced, receptacle outside removed, removed a couple of trees on the hill to ease mowing, and there is an upstairs window leaking that will be fixed. There was discussion on the new kitchen remodel project, and President Finch reports a meeting with a contractor to be held tomorrow, January 14, 2020. Pastor reports the cost of snow removal up our church hill is covered by the city of Lohman.

#### Stewardship: Paula Linsenbardt

In Paula's absence, Pastor David reports on a form change that pertains to the review of congregational records.

### Mutual Ministry: Vacant (Pastor David Viles)

Pastor reports we are still very much in need of a chairperson for this group. The committee will review and revise the Church Handbook, as last revision was in 2011. (NOTE: As of the Annual Congregational meeting Scott Soell has joined the Church Council as Mutual Ministry Chair and Jana Thompson has joined as a member.)

#### Fruendschaft Gruppe: Jeannette Fischer, Chair

On Wednesday, January 8, 19 members gathered to take down the Christmas Tree and all decorations and store everything away for another year. Our work load was made much lighter by Les and Kathryn who removed all the outdoor decorations several days earlier. Major thanks to them for doing so. We then enjoyed a delicious wine, cheese and soup supper. Thanks to all who furnished pots of soup and all the rest. Looking ahead: Our gruppe will journey to Arrow Rock on Saturday, July 25 to see Sister Act at 2 PM. The group rate is \$34 each. Reservations and payment are due by June 14. If you would like to join us, please let me know by that date. Following the play, we will enjoy dinner at a local restaurant. More information will soon be available about that. #### Safety and Security: Rich Prosch

The St. Paul's Safety and Security Committee met on Friday, January 10 to review our response plan for active assailants and discuss best practices for our congregation in light of societal church violence. Keeping the pastor and congregation of St. Paul's safe—whether during worship service, Sunday school, special events, or during the day to day maintenance of the church—is and always has been the goal of the committee. Our 2020 plan for active assailants was discussed as a layered approach, first securing the perimeter of the church through additional lighting, implementing outdoor cameras, and improvements to our entranceways. Inside the church, a security team made up of members of the committee would assume additional responsibilities, including scheduled observation of the doors and grounds, monitoring camera feeds, and communicating with members. Just as with our ongoing weather plan, the security team would also offer response drills for the congregation and train together. After being led through a review of the Texas church shooting by David Finch, the committee entered into a thorough discussion about firearms in church. Topics included specific legal issues, church and individual liability, readiness preparation and training, and the development of an overall firearms policy for our members.

At the conclusion of the meeting, motion was made by Finch to initiate a 2020 Active Assailant Plan in three areas, in tandem:


- Address our church perimeter with lights, cameras and improvements to doors.
- Develop new practices during Sunday worship and other gatherings including the locking of secondary doors and monitoring the front doors and parking lot.
- Implement a posted "no-firearms" policy for the church except for authorized members of the security team approved by the Pastor in accordance with state law, and who will be required to pass extensive education and training sessions.

Motion was seconded by Koestner and voted on unanimously by the committee.

The Security and Safety Committee officially submitted the recommendation to the Church Council, and it was adopted at their January 13th meeting.



## Reading Through the Bible ← New Schedule for the Month.

**Some of what we have learned the past 4 weeks.** Last month we began reading the epistles (letters) written by the Apostle Paul. We finished Romans and began reading letters he wrote to the churches he set up in other nations.

**1st and 2nd Corinthians**. He wrote to correct some errors the church was experiencing at the time. There was a lot of division because different groups were claiming to be followers of certain Apostles: Paul, Apollos, Cephas and Christ.

He says only Christ was crucified for them, not the Apostles. They should be united in Christ alone. There were other matters of treating each other poorly and sinning in various ways, mostly against each other. The second letter to Corinth gives instruction for the church and it is the one book that gives a lot of information about Paul himself including the famous 'thorn in his side.'

**Galatians** was written to the church of Galatia. They had begun to teach Gentiles they had to follow Jewish laws. Paul points out there is only one law and it is found in the love of God for his children. He tells them about the fruit of the Spirit which is: "love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law."

**Ephesians** concerns the bond all people have in Christ Jesus. All people are blessed by God's grace for their salvation and all should stand together as one against the evils of the world. This is where we find the passage saying to, "Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes."

**Philippians**, unlike the other letters, Paul does not write to address a crisis or complaint. He writes to express his appreciation and affection for the people. This is the letter where we find the much loved verse of encouragement, "I can do all this through him who gives me strength."

**Colossians** was infected by Greek philosophers who were trying to mix their philosophy with Christian theology. They taught that the physical world was evil and Jesus was a spirit and not a man. Paul writes to establish the omnipotence of God's Son and to correct this false teaching.

**Thessalonians 1 & 2**, Paul writes in fear the church is not doing well but gets a report from Timothy who says they are hanging in there. Paul instructs them to "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." Great advice for us all.

Timothy 1 & 2, Paul writes to instruct young Timothy on how to be a good Pastor for the church.

Titus was another young pastor who Paul instructs in the same way as he did Timothy.

**Philemon** is a slave owner who Paul writes while sending back one of his slaves. Paul says to treat him not as a slave but as a brother who will be of much value to him working in that capacity.

**Hebrews** was written to show Jesus' role as intercessor between us and the Father. His is the path of salvation.

James, The apostle James speaks about doing good works and also the threat of the words spoken unwisely.
