# Pastor's Message

"So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God.

I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

<Isaiah 41:10>

Many people are afraid these days and I understand some of the reasons why. I'm especially empathetic to those who are near my age or older and/or have other medical issues that put them at high risk of contracting the coronavirus which can be disastrous for them or even fatal.

St. Paul's opened the doors to in person worship service on June 14<sup>th</sup> and we had 53 members come and join together in the sanctuary with social distancing practices and other restrictions. But even with the restrictions it was great to see people sitting in the pews again after a three-month absence. The following Sunday on June 21<sup>st</sup> we confirmed JD and Christopher in church with a total of 40 members attending. This past Sunday we had 37 attend church in person.

During the past three weeks we had an additional 557 views on the internet (185 weekly average). Should we be afraid? The scriptures reveal two things about fear.

One is from several instances of the verse from above. We do not fear the world or what the world can do to us because the world is not our future. With the help of God our future lies in the Kingdom to come, the one Jesus brought near. Regardless of what the virus or the torments of the world do to our body, God's righteous right hand will lift us from this world and bring us through the gates of heaven where true life begins and never ends. We heard from Matthew 10:28 on June 21, "do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Which brings us to number two, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding." Proverbs 9:10

Here we understand that listening to God brings us wisdom, such as that given to Solomon. God has instructed Doctors, Researchers, Scientists and others with the wisdom and knowledge to defeat the virus' of the world with his help.

If we listen to the wisdom God has provided us through his servants he has instructed, then we have nothing to fear. Be safe, wear a mask, wash your hands, and in this way you take care of your neighbor by fearing the Lord only and keeping your ears open to the wisdom he gives us.

Thank you for your faithfulness in continuing to gather together. I look forward to the day this virus is defeated and we can shake hands and hug and be united in person, but until then, the peace of Christ be with you always.

# Ask the Pastor

**Question:** I hear Pastor talking about God's mission when we give our offering or the mission of the church when we leave at the end of the worship service. What is this 'Mission' and what does it mean?

**Answer:** "He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." < Micah 6:8> NIV

Perhaps the best way to get to this answer is to ask another: Why do we go to church? The answer to this question seems simple enough, we go to church to worship our God who created us and sent his Son to bless us with forgiveness and eternal life. While that is true, it is only one facet of worship. We could just come by and throw a steak on the grill and call it a morning like they did in the good old days. But we stay and listen to readings and teachings and sing songs in regular times and rejoice with each other in God's name. We go to church to worship God for what we are given, but we also come to hear God's holy word and learn what God has done for us and what we can do in response to the gifts of his loving grace.

When we listen to God's word we hear many promises to care for us, save us, heal us, love us and be with us. For Martin Luther the word promise was a favorite synonym for gospel (good news). The word promise comes from the old latin: promissum which is pro ("forth") and missum ("sent"). The promise, the gospel, is to be sent forth into the world. This is what God does, he sends his Son to redeem and save us.

While Jesus is on the earth, fully God and fully human, he teaches us about the kingdom of heaven which he brings near. This kingdom is the righteous way in how we are treated by God with love and justice and mercy. As Christians, we learn these things so that we can be emissaries of God on earth.

Two weeks ago we heard Jesus tell us in the gospel of Matthew, "

A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master."

God's promise and mission is to make sure his beloved creation is cared for through his love, justice and mercy.

The mission of the church, that is all of us who follow the teachings of Jesus the Christ is be sent forth into the world being like the teacher, the master and caring for our brothers and sisters who have been created in God's image just as we have been. Our mission is to use what God has given us to show his love, justice and mercy to everyone with our hands and feet doing God's will for his creation.

Receiving is part of the mission, and then giving what we have received to others in the name of our Lord and Savior completes the mission. In this way we are truly followers of Jesus' commands to go forth and make disciples of all nations and to do this with the knowledge that Jesus is with us until the end of the age.

At the end of month on July 26, 2020, we plan to confirm Lexie Plochberger and Kylee Scheperle during our worship service at St. Paul's church.


