Pastor's Message

"God is not unjust; he will not forget your work and the love you have shown him as you have helped his people and continue to help them." Hebrews 6:10

One of the commands we hear from Jesus during his three years of ministry on this earth is to follow him and serve in whatever ways we can to glorify God, care for our neighbors and make God's word known to others.

As I consider Gertrude Strobel's service to God and the church,

I can only imagine what the world would look like if everyone dedicated their life to serving God as she has done playing the organ for St. Paul's church.

She started playing the organ here full time in 1946 after substituting for some time while the previous organist played.



Gert retired this year having played to God's glory for 74 years. That is remarkable and an amazing accomplishment when we think about it. She has played the organ longer than a great many people have lived their entire lives.

In conversations I have had with Gert she has told me stories of the many occasions she has played the organ and it wasn't only at St. Paul's. In years past when Russellville or some other church did not have a Pastor available, our Pastor would go to fill in and, of course, he would take Gert along with him to play on their organ even when she was a young girl.

I can't imagine the number of Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals Gert has played for during her 74-year ministry of music at and around St. Paul's church. I suppose I could go through the church records but that would mean looking at four large record books and the earliest one is written entirely in the German language.

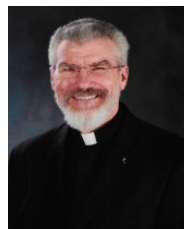
During her time as our organist, she was blessed to be a part of the ministry in so many lives. I wouldn't be surprised to learn of children at whose baptism she played and then their wedding and also their funeral. Truly a lifetime of serving God and our congregation in the ministry of music where God's word is sung and heard.

Gert retired from her long musical ministry this year but that doesn't mean her music has stopped. The notes she played for so many occasions at St. Paul's will ring true in the hearts of this congregation for decades to come. We will stop at times, especially while sitting in the sanctuary of our church and remember her music played for our loved one and for us. Especially when our children were baptized, married and loved ones had left to join the saints of light in God's kingdom.

The writer of Hebrews says, "God is not unjust; he will not forget your work and the love you have shown him as you have helped his people and continue to help them."

To Gertrude Strobel I say, 'neither will we forget your work and the love you have shown us as you have helped us during our times of need when your music healed our hearts and gave us joy. Neither will we forget...' Let us all serve with the heart of Gertrude Strobel.

Ask the Pastor

Question: Ezekiel 18:2, reads: "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge." How should that be interpreted? What did it mean at the time it was written and how would that apply to today's world?

Answer: First off, what does it mean for your teeth to be set on edge? Outside of the Bible I'm not sure that I've ever heard this phrase. But hearing it causes me to imagine a terrible consequence to an action. For example, if I bite into a lemon my face will contort and my teeth will clamp together and may even grind on each other until I get over the sour taste and sensation caused by the juice of the lemon. The same thing may happen if someone runs their fingernails down a chalkboard, if you can even find a chalkboard these days. Or if someone does something horrific I am forced to cringe and turn away.

So I turned to Merriam-Webster to see what they say about this phrase and under synonyms and antonyms it stated: "to disturb the peace of mind of (someone) especially by repeated disagreeable acts."

This is exactly what was happening in the Old Testament when God's people would rebel and seek the ways of the world instead of the ways of God. In those days the people would act wickedly and eventually God would have enough of it and cause the people to suffer for their evil deeds.

When God caused suffering for the people, it was not only the adults who suffered because of their transgressions but also their children who had no part in the sins of their parents. God drove the people out of their lands and into the hands of their enemies where they were treated badly and made to work long hours in terrible conditions, the parents and the children.

When God rescued the people from Egypt he led them out of that land and toward a land of milk and honey. But the people rebelled and made idols and turned to sinful ways. So God made them wander in the wilderness for 40 years until all of the original people died. But the children also wandered with them and their teeth were set on edge because of their parent's wrong doing.

Then in Jeremiah, God proclaims a new covenant will be made with his people. He says, "In those days people will no longer say, 'The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge.' Instead, everyone will die for their own sin; whoever eats sour grapes—their own teeth will be set on edge." Jeremiah 31:29-30

Congregational Council Meeting, October 12, 2020

A Congregational Council meeting called to order by President Zola Finch at 6:35pm on Monday October 12, 2020 in the church basement with social distancing in compliance with Covid 19 guidelines. Present were council members Zola Finch, Laurie Koestner, Kathy Meller, Dan Tschirgi, Delores Vlach, Mitch Plochberger, Scott Soell and Becky Weber. Also present was Pastor David Viles, and Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe. Absent was Paula Linsenbardt.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Pastor Viles, followed by a devotion on 1 Thessalonians 3:2-4: "We sent Timothy, who is our brother and co-worker in God's service in spreading the gospel of Christ, to strengthen and encourage you in your faith, so that no one would be unsettled by these trials. For you know quite well that we are destined for them. In fact, when we were with you, we kept telling you that we would be persecuted. And it turned out that way, as you well know." Pastor said the verse he read tells us that affliction is a normal part of the Christian life. Some people promote Christianity as a joy-filled life of bliss. In many ways it is because as Christians, we understand that no matter what happens, our future is the kingdom of God. And for this reason we can also take joy in the midst of suffering, because this world is not our home. Pastor shared with us that some of his close pastor friends from other states have been dealing with a lot of deaths and fall out from corona virus, as well as divisions caused by the current political situation in our nation. His friends are seeing several of their pastor friends quitting the ministry and not seeking another call. Sometimes it is difficult not to throw in the towel, impossible to see light in darkness, and it looks like the world's riches offer us a better way. All of us suffer in one way or another. The unbeliever may live it up, but then we see some of the wealthiest and most famous take their lives. Pastor said he doesn't believe we can dismiss it only as mental illness. He believes those who live for the world alone can never be satisfied. That is its own type of suffering that is meant to lead people to wholeness in Jesus. Our suffering helps us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus. He is our hope and destiny as we look forward to the day we will all be together in the place Jesus has prepared for us. Though it is not always easy, if we turn our attention to God, we will find the spark of light in the darkness and it will grow to bring us to the other side. This is not only true during corona virus and our political situation but also as we struggle with kids not coming to Sunday school and other church concerns for this council of church believers. The struggle is real, but so is God.

President Finch called for approval of the previous council meeting minutes. A motion to approve was made by Dan Tschirgi, seconded by Delores Vlach, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch called on Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe to give the treasurer's report.

Pastor David reported a total of 24 miles for the month of September for the amount of \$13.80. A motion was made to approve the September mileage \$13.80 by Scott Soell, seconded by Kathy Meller, and passed via voice vote. Pastor David reported the following activities for September 2020: Worship and Music meeting, Church Council meeting, City Council, two Ministerial Alliance meetings, one Synod Meeting for Osage Conference, one marriage conversation, one marriage planning discussion, two phone visits, and other phone conversations. Other activities include: picked up mail at post office, one wedding rehearsal, performed one wedding ceremony, and created, emailed the October Epistle. Pastor performed four in person, with online worship services, two of these were Communion Sundays.

President Finch called for the Standing Committee Reports which are included below.

Old Business: President Finch reports we will continue with our current Covid-19 procedures. President Finch reports Cross Training of paid staff positions are currently on hold.

New Business: Next council meeting will be 11/9/2020 and begin at 6:00 pm instead of 6:30pm. President Finch called for a motion to adjourn. A motion to adjourn was made by Laurie Koestner, seconded by Delores Vlach, and passed via voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 8:20 pm, Pastor closed the meeting in leading the council members with The Our Father prayer.

Evangelism: Delores Vlach reports their committee decided that our church members will not provide refreshments for the November election due to coronavirus. Trunk or Treat will be held on October 31, 2020 from 5:30 pm to 7:00 pm following CDC Guidelines for Trunk or Treat. These guidelines were shared with council members by President Finch, and will be posted in the church narthex. Trunk or Treat will be cancelled if we have inclement weather.

Technology: Dan Tschirgi reports an additional ambient microphone was installed and is working pretty well.

Worship & Music: Kathy Meller reports we have resumed having a song leader for worship. Upcoming events include the following: October 25th is Reformation Sunday, November 1st is All Saints Sunday, November 22nd is Christ the King Sunday, November 25th, 6:30 pm is Thanksgiving Eve service, and November 29th begins the Advent season and we will start using setting 3.

Parish Education: Laurie Koestner reports God's Work, Our Hands t-shirts have been ordered. Volunteers for assisting with requested projects will meet October 18th at 11:00 am at Trinity Lutheran Church, Russellville. She reports "0" attendance for Sunday School. Laurie made a motion to suspend Sunday School classes and LYO meetings /activities until 2021. Dan Tschirgi seconded this motion, and motion passed via voice vote. High School students are welcome and encouraged to attend Adult Class which is a study provided by Pastor on the current Sunday's Gospel.

Church Improvement: Mitch Plochberger requests in lieu of church workday, people contact him to donate time for various needed projects. He reported the following ongoing projects: work on the church light pole, bids for Parsonage roof repair, and bids for church doors.

Stewardship and Finance: Paula Linsenhardt, absent. President Finch reports Stacy Bubach will help with the 2021 budget.

Mutual Ministry: Scott Soell and Pastor David reports Background checks are nearly completed. Scott reports he is hearing no issues related to our worship services and no other church related problems.

Mobile Food Pantry: Audrey Bunch

The October 13th afternoon mobile was really a good time to be outside volunteering for the community at Trinity Lutheran Church parking lot. The weather was great to enjoy the sunshine and fresh air. We served 122 families with 400 people in those families. The drive through is going much smoother each month. Some of the items given away were: blueberry muffins, burritos, breakfast sandwiches, bagels, cooking spray, Italian dressing, Red Diamond Tea, cinnamon rolls, fresh produce was limes, melons, mushrooms and tomatoes and frozen assorted meats beef, chicken, fish and pork. Sadly, Albin Linsenbardt passed away on September 28, 2020 at St. Mary's hospital. Our lives were changed by the blessings we received from knowing him during his 102 year old life. Now our lives are changed again by our loss of this wonderful man of God.

Obituary

Albin William Linsenbardt, 102, of Lohman, passed away Monday, September 28, 2020, at St. Mary's Hospital.

He was born December 21, 1917, in Lohman, Missouri, the son of the late Gustav and Flora (Fluegal) Linsenbardt.

Albin served in the Army Air Corps being assigned to the 498th Bomb Group and later went on to serve as a crew chief for a B-29 Superfortress stationed on the Pacific Island of Saipan during World War II. While overseas, he estimated that he supported nearly 60

missions, only losing one aircraft that sustained engine trouble shortly after take-off. On December 15, 2019, he became the first recipient of the Missouri Veterans Good Conduct Award.

He was united in marriage on August 12, 1943, in Lohman, to Jacqueline Joyce Starling who preceded him in death on February 24, 2018.

Albin worked for Linsenbardt Motors in Jefferson City for his uncle, RG Letorneau Heavy Equipment Manufacturing and Schlitz Brewing Company in Texas, and for the former Westinghouse as an electrical supervisor retiring in 1982.

He was a member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Lohman and the VFW. Albin enjoyed bee keeping, wood working, and cattle farming on his land.

Survivors include three children, Abbie (Paula) Linsenbardt, Lohman; Stanley (Judy) Linsenbardt, Jefferson City; Barbara (Henry) Carrel, West Fork, AR; a daughter-in-law, Becky Linsenbardt, Mont Belvieu, TX; 12 grandchildren; and numerous great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, his son, Larry Linsenbardt; two sisters, Nelda (Oscar) Bubach, Olivia (Francis) Linhardt; and two brothers, Rupert (Corine) Linsenbardt, and Aldo (Charlotte) Linsenbardt.

Many children also participate in **The Greatest Journey**, a 12-lesson follow-up discipleship course, where they learn to follow Jesus and share Him with others. Each shoebox gift is an opportunity to tell the children around the world that God loves them and hasn't forgotten them.

All gifts must fit in a shoe-sized box. Any empty shoebox will work, making sure that the lid will close. A plastic shoebox is available at Hobby Lobby in Jefferson City at the front of the store. Brochures are also available at Hobby Lobby that include labels for the box and an envelope if you prefer to send the \$9 donation per box yourself via e-card, or credit card.

Shoeboxes or donations of toys, etc. for the shoeboxes can be dropped off at St. Paul's church any time between Monday, October 26, 2020 and Friday, November 13, 2020. When dropping off shoeboxes or items for shoeboxes, please include \$9 for each box. Monetary donations are also welcome. Monetary donations would go toward purchasing items for shoeboxes, shipping, and distribution costs.

Donations can be done three ways:

1. Purchase items for the shoebox, go online at samaritanspurse.org/occ to give your \$9 donation via e-check or credit card and receive a tracking label for your box. You could also pick up a brochure from Hobby Lobby that contains labels on the back and an envelope is also included. Pack your shoebox and deliver to church then volunteers will deliver to the distribution center.

2. Purchase items for a shoebox, pack the shoebox, drop shoebox off at church where volunteers will attach labels and deliver to the distribution center.

3. Make a monetary donation and volunteers will shop, pack and drop off the shoebox at the distribution center.
