Obituary for Gertrude Strobel

Gertrude Pauline Strobel, 96, of Lohman, passed away Wednesday, November 25, 2020, at her residence. She was born February 29, 1924, in Lohman, the daughter of the late Alfred and Antonia (Michael) Raithel.

Gert was a 1943 graduate of Jefferson City High School and attended the University of Missouri in Columbia. She was united in marriage on June 24, 1967, in Lohman, to Hugo Albert Strobel who preceded her in death on September 23, 2012.

Gert worked for Metropolitan Life as a bookkeeper and eventually retired in 1981 as assistant office manager. After retirement, she become the City Clerk for Lohman until 1993. She was a member of the La Vida chapter of the American Business Women's Association in Jefferson City, where she served as the first president. She was named the Chapter's 1956 American Business Woman of the Year. Gert was a life-long member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Lohman where she served as the church organist since 1946. She considered playing the organ as an integral part of her life. She also edited the church's newsletter for over 50 years. In 2001, the church named Gert and her husband, Hugo, Volunteers of the Year.

Gert is survived by her nieces and nephews and other extended family members. She was preceded in death by her parents; her husband, Hugo Strobel; and her twin sisters, Marvelia and Mary Raithel. The Great First Communion Celebration of 2020

St. Paul's Church had five children this year who were welcomed to their first communion service. It has been a difficult year with the Covid-19 virus which has caused many changes and hardships for our Worship Service at St. Paul's since the many restrictions went into place on March 15, 2020 in order that we might be mindful of our church members and keep them safe. The Church Council decided to suspend in person attendance after our service on November 15, 2020. Our First Communion was scheduled for November 22, 2020. But with God's help we prevailed to make it happen. Our kids attended four classes over a month to learn what communion is all about and what it means to us as children of God to receive the body and blood of our Lord in remembrance of him. There was a lot of discussion and a little homework and they all did great. So on Sunday, November 22nd the five families attended church separated by social distance and wearing masks until the moment of communion. It was wonderful and I was so proud of these kids has they led their families in receiving communion.















Ask the Pastor

Question: Every year during the Advent season we set up an Advent Wreath with five candles. Why do we do that and what does it mean?



Answer: The Advent wreath is a special tradition we use to recognize Jesus the Christ and our expectation of his return in the clouds to judge the living and the dead.

As Lutherans and Christians in general, we use symbols to physically express the beliefs and creeds of our faith. Consider the Cross that is the mainstay of our belief. You will see it on altars, stain glass windows, books and booklets and even worn as a pin or necklace.

There are two Crosses you will see, one is empty and the other has a figure of Jesus hanging on it also known as a crucifix. The empty cross reminds us that Jesus is no longer there but defeated death on the cross and is alive. The crucifix reminds us that the body of Christ did in fact die for the forgiveness of our sins.

In the same way, the Advent wreath with its four candles is a symbol of Christ's return into the world. It is believed the wreath was created by a Lutheran Pastor in Germany by the name of Johann Hinrich Wichern at the beginning of the 1800's. To help the children at a school he founded visually see a count of 24 candles being lit, one each day, until Christmas when they would celebrate the birth of Christ. He made a large wooden ring from an old cart wheel with 20 small red and four

large white candles. A red candle was lit each day and a white candle on each Sunday.

From the time of the middle ages, fire has been used to represent the light of Christ returning to the world. The Advent wreath with its candles continues this symbolism as the light grows with each candle lit until all four candles are burning bright and the final fifth candle is lit on Christmas Eve to announce the arrival of baby Jesus with all the light blazing on the wreath.

The wreath, made into a circle, came to represent the eternal victory over death through Jesus Christ. It is an endless loop to show Christ's victory will never end and neither will life as we are given an eternal life with him in the heavenly kingdom.

The evergreens were a sign of the faithfulness of God to God's people, even in death, as evergreens do not lose their leaves like the other flowers and deciduous trees.

The lighted candles are a reminder of the light of Christ brought into the world. They have also come to represent the gifts and blessings we have been given through our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ. The three blue candles represent Hope as we await the second coming of Christ. The pink or rose candle represents the Rejoice of Christ's arrival and the large white candle is the pure light of Christ. In recent years the four candles have been assigned the virtues of Hope, Love, Joy and Peace.

Blessings to you, Pastor David Trunk or Treat was held this year on Saturday, October 31, 2020 in the parking lot of St. Paul's Church. We had a great time with a dozen cars who came out with lots of candy for the kiddos and maybe a few adults that act like kids. And also the Fire Truck and volunteers from Lohman and Russellville.



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Samaritan's Purse is an organization created by Franklin Graham to provide food, clothes, hygienic supplies, toys, and the word of God to underprivileged children around the world. One such program that occurs every November is the Children's Christmas Shoebox program that St. Paul's recently participated in.

Congregational Council Meeting, November 9, 2020

A Congregational Council meeting called to order by President Zola Finch at 6:00pm on Monday November 9, 2020 in the church basement with social distancing in compliance with Covid 19 guidelines. Present were council members Zola Finch, Kathy Meller, Dan Tschirgi, Delores Vlach, Mitch Plochberger, and Becky Weber. Stacy Bubach was also present to represent Paula Linsenbardt. Also present were Pastor David Viles, and Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe. Absent were Laurie Koestner, Scott Soell, and Paula Linsenbardt.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Pastor David, followed by a devotion on Matthew 11:28: "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." Pastor David expressed his concerns over this past month's multitude of duties, the various needs of our members and non-members, to include Covid related health issues, and to include his mother-in-law who has now recovered from Covid. Pastor resumed Adult Sunday School and First Communion classes and expressed concern with having to cancel Children's Sunday School. President Finch called on Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe to give the treasurer's report.

Pastor David reported a total of 12 miles for the month of October, and wishes to donate the cost Pastor David was thanked for this. Pastor David reported the following activities for October 2020: Worship and Music meeting, Church Council meeting, City Council, Lions Club, Bishop's Convocation, Mutual Ministry, two home visits, and four church office visits, and multiple phone conversations for counseling and prayers. Additional activities include Food Bank, First Communion Classes, Adult Sunday School, Trunk or Treat, and created, emailed and post mailed the November Epistle. Other activities include: picked up mail at post office, one wedding rehearsal, and performed one wedding ceremony. Pastor performed four in person, with online worship services, two of these were Communion Sundays.

She reports there were some very interesting costumes, one from our own council member, Dan Tschirgi, who dressed as Alice Cooper. Delores reports the Epistle is available for nonmembers for a small fee. Delores welcomed our two new members, Patty Duncan and Jake Thompson. Welcome Patty and Jake!

Technology: Dan Tschirgi reports the new microphone was installed, and our new video equipment is working well.

Worship & Music: Kathy Meller reports there will be a re-dedication of our organ and dedication of the Audiovisual system this Sunday. She reports receiving our License Agreement to allow us to legally live stream Sunday worship services. The Worship Committee will meet tomorrow to plan the November worship services and pick the December hymns.

Parish Education: Laurie Koestner, absent. Pastor reports there was a nice attendance for "Gods Work, Our Hands" day, with four work activities completed in Russellville, MO. working with Trinity church.
