

Pastor's Message

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another." Romans 12:4-5

During the season of Lent, we were unable to gather as we normally do in the Fellowship Hall with a Lenten theme and music while singing the Holden Evening Prayer. It is a special time to gather in community with each other and the church around the world and be in community with God and each other. Instead this year I held an online devotional each Wednesday during the Lenten period which was centered around 'Community' even though we were not physically together.

The first week was 'Community with creation.' We heard about Jesus calming a storm after being aroused from sleep in the rear of the boat. Jesus is the Word and God created all things through the Word as we have read in Genesis. Humans also were created and are in community with creation as a part of it. And God saw all that he had made and it was good.

The second week was about 'Community with the Saints.' God chose Abram who he renamed Abraham to be the father of a nation of God's people. Abraham believed through faith that God would do all that he said. All of the people who have gone before and are no longer here have handed down to us a strong belief and faith in God and Jesus' work on the cross and resurrection. We are in community with all those saints who have nurtured our faith.

The third week was about 'Community with our neighbors.' We heard the story of neighbors bringing someone to Jesus to heal. The only way to do that was to lower him through the roof. I have watched this congregation for the past three and a half years do whatever it takes to care for our neighbors.

The fourth week was about 'Community with those on the margins.' These are the ones who are very poor, homeless, hungry, neglected, and shunned. When we read the Bible, we see Jesus helping all of these people who are in need but neglected by normal society. Our world tells us to take care of ourselves and not worry about those who can't take care of themselves. But Jesus tells us there is another way, a better way, and gives us plenty of examples to follow. Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Let us come together in community with the marginalized.

The fifth and final week was about 'Community with Christ.' We hear the story of James and John, the

Zebedee brothers, asking to be in power at his right and left hand. The world and the call of its temptations is the place of power struggles that compels man against man and woman against woman. Jesus teaches that we must be servants to all just has he has been. When we are in community with Christ, we are one in his name and follow him.

Ask the Pastor

Question: Who are all those women named Mary in the Bible?

Answer: Mary was a common name during the time of Jesus. The name comes from Miriam, you may remember that Moses had a sister named Miriam.

The New Revised Standard Version lists 48 while the New International Version lists 52. No wonder it is so confusing. There are six different women named Mary in the Bible. Let's take a look.

- 1. Mary, wife of Joseph and mother of Jesus. She was a peasant girl from a backwater town named Nazareth. Thirty years later a man named Nathanael would say to his brother Philip, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Mary did and from her womb came Jesus the Christ, the savior of the world.
- 2. Mary Magdalene, was a woman from the town of Magdala which means "tower" or "castle" and it was a thriving and populous town during the time of Jesus ministry. It was located about three miles from Capernaum on the coast of Galilee. It was known for Dye works and primitive textile factories which made the community wealthy. It may be that Mary of Magdala was connected to the industries which gave her the means to support Jesus' ministry. Jesus healed her of seven demons that came out of her. (Luke 8:1-3). She has been falsely accused of being a prostitute but there is no evidence to support that allegation.
- 3. Mary of Bethany, was the sister of Lazarus who was raised from the dead. She loved to sit at Jesus' feet and listen to his teachings, much to the consternation of her sister Martha who kept busy with work around the house. Six days before Jesus enters Jerusalem for the last time, he stops at the home of Lazarus. This Mary takes a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard and anoints Jesus' feet. For this Judas is angry saying it was wasted but Jesus commends her for the loving act of anointing him before his burial.
- 4. Mary, the mother of James and Joses. We know very little about this woman except she is the mother of James the Less called so to distinguish him from the more well-known James Zebedee, brother of John. Similar to Magdalene, this Mary also had wealth and followed Jesus and supported his ministry. Some writers identify her as "the other Mary" (Matthew 27:61), or as the wife of Cleopas or Alphaeus (Matthew 10:3; Luke 24:18), or as a sister of Mary, the mother of Jesus.
- 5. Mary, the mother of John Mark is only mentioned once in Acts 12:12. It was to her home that Peter went after his Miraculous escape from prison (Acts 12:6-11). Mary opened her home to Christian followers even though the people were be persecuted at the time by the Roman soldiers.
- 6. Mary of Rome. We know least of this woman of all those counted. We only hear about her in Paul's personal greetings of twenty or so people who worked with him to share the good news. Mary is the only one of the group with a Jewish name. (Romans 16:3-15). Mary was an evangelist employed in making the gospel known in the same way as the Salvation Army uses women today. These godly women exerted their influence in every possible way to aid Paul in making Christ known.

A Congregational Council meeting was called to order by President Zola Finch at 6:05 p.m. on Monday March 8, 2021. Present at council meeting were council members President Zola Finch, Kathy Meller, Dan Tschirgi, Delores Vlach, Mitch Plochberger, Jana Thompson and Becky Weber. Also present were Pastor David Viles and Council Treasurer, Kay Pascoe. Absent was Paula Linsenbardt.

Pastor David opened the meeting with a prayer, then shared a devotion on Philippians 4-7.

"Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

Everyone, everywhere has had a lot to deal with during the past year. Finally, we are beginning to see some relief from the Covid-19 virus with many people getting the vaccines. Many have begun to relax a little and let the fear have less control over their every thought and action.

St. Paul's restarted in-person attendance again on February 7th and we had 23 people show up for that Sunday. We were closed due to weather the second Sunday but then had 65 people attend on the following Sunday, and 58 on February 28th. These numbers are pushing our capacity for social distancing and Easter Sunday is coming soon which makes us a little anxious with higher numbers expected.

Zola and I spoke about it a little yesterday and decided, 'what can we do?' and I think that is the correct strategy. The truth is we as humans are unable to change events that may happen. If we live every moment confined to our bed, we would still experience problems.

So, we live life with as much joy as possible as God intended. Only God is in control and whatever happens in this world happens. What can we do?"

Paul gives us the answer, "in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus..." Thanks be to God.

President Finch called for approval of the previous council meeting minutes. A motion to approve the February 8, 2021 council meeting minutes was made by Delores Vlach, seconded by Kathy Meller, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch called for Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe's report. Kay presented the financial report.

Pastor David reported the following activities for February, 2021: Worship and Music email meeting, Church Council meeting, City Council, Lions Club, and Ministerial Alliance. Pastor performed one home visit, one church visit, three phone visits, and multiple phone conversations, counseling and prayers. Pastor held one communion service via Facebook livestream only, two non-communion, and one communion worship services, in person and with Facebook livestream. Pastor also held one mid-week Lenten devotion. Pastor prepared, printed and emailed worship bulletins, updated the website with bulletin and video services, presented financial report at the ministerial alliance meeting, posted a daily photo with Bible verse and message on Church Facebook, and created, emailed and had our secretary postal mail the March Epistle. President Finch commended Pastor David on the fabulous Epistle he created.

President Finch then called for the committee reports.

Evangelism: Delores Vlach reports her committee will not serve refreshments at the April 6, 2021 election due to concerns of the Covid virus. She reports her committee is considering having fellowship hour following July 4th worship service but will revisit this at a later date to determine Covid recommendations put forth by the Cole County Health department.

Technology: Dan Tschirgi reports the FM radio transmission is working well, and people should be able to pick up the Sunday worship services on their FM radios, on station 104.1. Dan requests additional volunteers to help with Sunday worship video services. Volunteers will be adequately trained. President Finch was thanked for the donation of the new computer rack/desk to be used for livestream video services.

Worship and Music: Kathy Meller reports Sutton Loesch will be baptized on March 14, and Phillip Soell and his sisters, Madison and Mackenzie will be baptized on March 21. She reports there will be in-person worship service on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Kathy adds we will begin using Setting 8 after Easter.

Parish Education: Laurie Koestner reports Sunday School re-opened on February 28, and there were two students in attendance, and there were six in attendance on March 7. She also reports there will be an Easter Egg hunt following Easter Service April 4. President Finch reports she will host a get together for middle school and high school students at her home with snacks and show the movie Jesus Christ Super Star, with John Legend and Alice Cooper, adding that Covid 19 precautions will be observed by all students and adults in attendance.

Church Improvement: Mitch Plochberger reports spring clean-up work day is set for April 10, and asks for volunteers to meet at church around 8:00 a.m., or whenever you can come. The downstairs water fountain has been replaced and is working well. The downstairs men's restroom urinal is in need of work. Gary Elliott worked on the furnace and it is working well. Mitch reports the sanctuary lights that are in need of repair are being worked on. He reports the Parsonage roof repair is a work in progress.

Stewardship and Finance: Paula Linsenbardt, absent. No report.

Mutual Ministry: Jana Thompson. Jana reports they did not meet this month due to snow. She reports her committee is still in need of one more committee member.

Old Business: President Finch reports we are in need of people willing to be cross trained for staff paid positons. Pastor David reports he can do the work of our church secretary if need be. President Finch reports there is no report/updates on security camera.

New Business: President Finch reports the new copier/scanner has been ordered, and paid for in its entirety by two church members who wish to remain anonymous. The copier will have the same type of service agreement as the current one with payment per budget line item. President Finch presented to council members the possibility of placing a church lock box in the narthex for church donations, that will remain in place at all times. After discussion, it was decided Pastor David will email congregants to determine if anyone is opposed to this idea.

President Finch called for a motion to adjourn. A motion to adjourn was made by Laurie Koestner, seconded by Jana Thompson, and passed via voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 7:50 p.m. Pastor closed the meeting with the Lord's prayer.

Mobile Food Pantry: Audrey Bunch

The weather was great for the March 9th Mobile Food Pantry truck to be in Russellville at Trinity Lutheran parking lot. The volunteers served 134 families with 415 people in those families. Some of the items given out are as listed: frozen assorted steaks, chicken, hot dogs, bacon, rope sausage and pizzas. Fresh produce, a box of vegetables, bags of lettuce, potatoes, also popcorn, eggs, chips, and organic milk.
