## Ask the Pastor

**Scripture:** "No, if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." Romans 12:20

Question: What is meant by the phrase "burning coals on their heads." ?

**Answer:** We find the explanation in the very next verse, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." Romans 12:21

Jesus teaches us that in the ways of the world, evil begets evil. It is a never-ending cycle of pain, anguish, and vengeance. There is never forgiveness or redemption there is only injustice.

Let's read the full text of this teaching by Jesus, Romans 12:9-21

"Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers

Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

Jesus teaches us that love is more powerful than hate, love overcomes hate, love prevails always. So the Apostle Paul takes up this message as he writes to the people of Rome where he has been imprisoned.

What happens when we love our enemies? What happens when we feed them, care for them, and treat them the way we want to be treated?

By doing these things we show our adversaries a different way, a better way, the way of Christ. We show them a life they have not lived in their cycle of cycle of pain, anguish, and vengeance. We show them the way of Christ is better than what they have been taught from birth to adulthood.

In showing them a new way the hope is they will see how unjust they have been and will repent of doing wrong and harm to others.

These burning coals will be similar to the purification fires the goldsmiths use to heat up the iron ore and separate the impurities that float to the top as dross and leave behind the pure gold that has been refined. The analogy of the burning coals is a way that may lead the enemy to repent and see the way of gift of love bestowed on him/her and learn that love and kindness is the way, the truth and the life. **Note 1:** Paul is quoting Proverbs 25:21-22 "If your enemies are hungry, give them bread to eat; and if they are thirsty, give them water to drink; for you will heap coals of fire on their heads, and the Lord will reward you."

**Note 2:** In ancient Egypt, there was a practice of a person carrying a brazier of burning coals on their head as a public sign of shame and remorse for doing wrong. Perhaps with a cushion between after all it was a sign of repentance and not physical punishment.

A Congregational Council meeting was called to order by President Zola Finch at 6:05pm on Monday, August 9, 2021 in the church basement. Present were council members President Finch, Kathy Meller, Mitch Plochberger, Dan Tschirgi, Jana Thompson, Delores Vlach, Laurie Koestner and Becky Weber. Absent was Paula Linsenbardt. Also present were Pastor David Viles and Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe.

Pastor David opened the meeting with a prayer. Pastor then shared a devotion on Philippians 4:19-20. "And my God will fully satisfy every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus. To our God and Father be glory forever and ever. Amen."

**Devotion:** Does God satisfy our every need?

At times we all have moments when we really have to consider that question and the scriptures that proclaim this good news. There are people near us in this congregation and people not so near us who are hundreds, or thousands of miles away, living in desperate times. Some are suffering from diagnosis of cancer and having surgery or treatments. Others are unable to walk and going through physical therapy. Some are dealing with depression or mental issues that keep them from functioning in normal ways. Families are disrupted by internal struggles and families are torn by grief of a loved one's death. Where is the good news in these situations? How are their needs satisfied?

Cancer surgeries are successful and treatments that may not totally succeed are giving loved ones more time together to build memorable loving moments. Physical therapy is helping those walk who have been unable for months now. Medicines, counseling, and therapy are having positive effects on those with mental struggles. Disrupted families with internal struggles are finding strength in each other and discovering life can be awesome despite the troubles they have endured. Loved ones come together in the midst of grief laughing and crying at the joyful times they relive with the person they have lost to death.

The good news and satisfied needs have been fulfilled all around us in God's love.

President Finch called for approval of the previous council meeting minutes. Jana Thompson request that an amendment be made to the July 12, 2021 meeting minutes to reflect the reason she and Laurie Koestner were absent from this meeting was they were assisting with Vacation Bible School during the time of the meeting. A motion to approve the July 12, 2021 council meeting minutes with the aforementioned amendment was made by Jana Thompson, seconded by Dan Tschirgi, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch called on Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe to give the treasurers report, and copies of said report were distributed to council members. A motion to approve the treasurer's report was made by Kathy Meller, seconded by Laurie Koestner, and passed via voice vote.

Pastor David reports mileage for July is 24 miles, for the amount of \$13.44. A motion was made to approve Pastor David's mileage for July was made by Kathy Meller, seconded by Laurie Koestner, and passed via voice vote.

Pastor David reported the following activities for July 2021: Worship and Music meeting, S.T.A.R.S., Lions Club, Church Council meeting, City Council, and the 4th of July Planning Meeting. Pastor performed one office counseling visit, three office member visits, phone conversations, prayers, and visits at the office and parsonage.

Pastor held four services for June, two communion Sunday worship services in person and online with Facebook Live, and two non-communion services in person and online with Facebook Live. Pastor prepared, printed and emailed worship bulletins, updated website with bulletin and video services, posted a daily photo with Bible verse and message on Church Facebook, and created, printed and emailed the July Epistle. He also ordered and received Thrivent card and supplies for Youth Food Booth,

helped plan for 4th of July activities, performed special Veteran's service and blessing of the new flag pole, performed master of ceremonies duty at the 4th of July event and posted pictures and videos on church website. He participated in Vacation Bible School activities two days at Trinity Lutheran Church in Russellville, covered for emergencies at Trinity while Pastor Ed was on vacation, and picked up trash on Route C with Jackie Wood and Frank Pascoe.

Thank-you Pastor David, Jackie and Frank for picking up trash, and doing so in the rain!

### President Finch then called for the committee reports.

**Evangelism:** Delores Vlach expressed appreciation and a big thank you to Cameron and Karey Freiner and family, and David and Karla Strobel for the August fellowship hour. She added that the muffins and drinks were delicious. To date, volunteers for Fellowship hour have signed up for the remaining months of this year. Delores suggests that we wait two to three weeks to make a final decision on the September Church Family Day due to the fact she called the Cole County Health Department and they reported to her they are seeing about 30-60 cases of Covid 19 per day. She added she and her committee will still have enough time to make preparations, after a decision is made. Council members discussed possibly switching dates of Church Family Day with the annual Cemetery meeting.

**Technology:** Dan Tschirgi reports he can still use more technology volunteers to assist with Sunday Worship video services. They will be adequately trained. Pastor David reports there is an average of over one hundred visitors online who watch live or at a later time on our Sunday Facebook Live worship services.

**Worship and Music:** Kathy Meller reports the September Hymns were selected via emails among the Worship and Music committee members. After some discussion, council members chose to use Setting 10 beginning in September.

**Parish Education:** Laurie Koestner requests we are in need of Sunday School teachers. Perhaps we can prayerfully consider assisting Laurie with teaching Sunday School. Our children are our future here at St. Paul's church. We must all cherish, love, pray for, and teach them. Sunday School is set to begin September 21, 2021. Laurie reports there were thirty-three students attending Vacation Bible School (VBS) last month. She added she was very happy that ten of our children attended from St. Paul's. Laurie reports the week went very well, and our Pastor David came to open with prayers, and a Bible story for two of the evenings. The theme for this year was "We are Treasured" and Laurie shared with council members what the t-shirts looked like. Jana Thompson also helped every evening. Thank-you Laurie, Jana, and Pastor David for helping make VBS a huge success!

**Church Improvement:** Mitch Plochberger reports the air conditioning issue in the Friendship Hall has been fixed, and the air conditioner filters have been checked. He reports Glen Stubinger installed automatic light switches in the four bathrooms in the church basement. Thank-you Glen for your work with installing these light switches.

**Stewardship and Finance:** Paula Linsenbardt. No report.

**Mutual Ministry:** Jana Thompson reports plans are underway to perform the staff evaluations, and may begin in September. She reports the Time and Talent sheets will be done later in the fall of this year.

**Old Business:** Blessing Box update. Dan reports he completed the construction of the Blessing Box. He suggested following the council meeting, we go outside and see it on the back of his truck. There was discussion on how best to mount the box. The Blessing Box will be a receptacle for donated non-perishable food items and toiletries for the benefit of those in need of such items. It was suggested perhaps Bibles could also be donated to the box.

**New Business:** Church Box. Pastor brought a church box to council meeting, that was donated by the Cameron Freiner family. Thank you Cameron, Karey, Kyle, Kate, Kara and Kiefer! The church Box is modeled to resemble a church and is constructed of wood. It has a lock on the front doors of the church box, and has a mail slot in the roof, that can be used to insert church offerings, monetary donations, and prayer requests. Council members discussed a possible location for the this box. After discussion, it was decided Pastor David will empty the box weekly to take care of prayer requests and distribute donations to the church recording secretary.

President Finch called for a motion to adjourn. A motion to adjourn was made by Dan Tschirgi, seconded by Jana Thompson, and passed via voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 7:25pm. Pastor closed the meeting with The Lord's Prayer.
