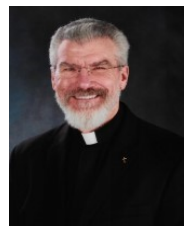

Ask the Pastor

Question: *Why do we do we make the sign of the cross and where did it come from?*

Answer: The sign of the cross is exactly that, a sign or a signature. Just as some people make an (X) on a document to show their name, Christians use the sign of the cross (✝) to say, "I belong to God". God has used signs with his people for a very long time, even back to the beginning when he created us in the Garden of Eden.

In the fourth chapter of Genesis, Cain kills his brother Abel and God punishes Cain by sending him away and out of his presence. Cain tells God the punishment is greater than he can bear! Cain worries that anyone he meets will kill him. "Then the Lord said to him, "Not so! Whoever kills Cain will suffer a sevenfold vengeance." And the Lord put a mark on Cain, so that no one who came upon him would kill him." God put a mark of protection or salvation upon Cain. This mark was a sign showing Cain belonged to the LORD.

In the twelfth chapter of Exodus, God is about to place the tenth and final plague on Egypt to free his people. It will be a plague of death for the first born of all men and livestock. But God would save the Israelites by using a sign. He commanded them to kill a lamb for the night in which he would strike this final plague. They were to use the blood of the lamb to mark the top and sides of their doors. When the Angel of death saw this sign they would be safe as the Angel passed over their family. This mark of blood on the doorways was a sign showing the people of the household belonged to the LORD.

In the eighth and ninth chapters of Ezekiel, the Prophet is given a vision and a command by the LORD. God shows him the abominations being committed in his Holy Temple. There are idols being worshiped and all kinds of creeping things and loathsome animals portrayed on the walls. At the north gate of the temple sat women weeping for Tammuz, an ancient Mesopotamian god associated with shepherds. Twenty-five men with their back to the temple worshipped the sun as it rose in the east and the land was filled with violence. Then God called out to the executioners of the city to come with their weapons. A man came with them clothed in linen, with a writing case at his side. God said to the man in linen, "Go through the city, through Jerusalem, and put a mark on the foreheads of those who sigh and groan over all the abominations that are committed in it." To the others God said, "Pass through the city after him, and kill; your eye shall not spare, and you shall show no pity. Cut down old men, young men and young women, little children and women, but touch no one who has the mark. This mark on the foreheads was a sign showing the people who were upset by the abominations belonged to the LORD.

In the seventh chapter of Revelation we hear this part of John's vision. "I saw another angel ascending from the rising of the sun, having the seal of the living God, and he called with a loud voice to the four angels who had been given power to damage earth and sea, saying, "Do not damage the earth or the sea or the trees, until we have marked the servants of our God with a seal on their foreheads." During the final days the earth and the evil people will be destroyed, but first God will protect the innocent with the mark of his seal on their foreheads. This mark of God's seal on the foreheads will be a sign showing the people who are innocent are to be protected and saved as they too belong to the LORD.

When we are baptized in the Lutheran church, we are marked with the sign of the cross upon our foreheads with the words, "child of God, you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever." This mark of the cross on the foreheads is a sign showing the baptized belong to the LORD.

For these reasons when we enter the church or at various times during worship we are to make the sign of the cross upon our self to proclaim, we are a child of God and belong to him.

A Congregational Council meeting was called to order by President Zola Finch at 6:00pm on Monday, November 8, 2021 in the youth education room. Present were council members Kathy Meller, Mitch Plochberger, Delores Vlach, Laurie Koestner, Paula Linsenbardt, Stacy Bubach, Jana Thompson and Becky Weber. Absent was Dan Tschirgi. Also present were Pastor David Viles and Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe.

Pastor David opened the meeting with a prayer, followed by a devotion. "Consider [Jesus] who endured such hostility against himself from sinners, so that you may not grow weary or lose heart." Hebrews 12:3

"The struggle is real" is a saying that describes everyday problems or just life in general. It is often said after several attempts to do a particular task before getting it finished. We all have those days, weeks or even months when it seems like life is so hard or at least a particular part of it that we are struggling with at the moment. The verse from Hebrews 12:3 is a wonderful word that speaks volumes in our struggles. When we consider what Jesus went through during his three years of ministry, it helps us to see that we are not alone. Even God incarnate found the struggle to be real. Jesus' goal was to lead the people in repentance and to teach them that love is the answer to all of our hostile ways. But Jesus struggled everyday to get the message out and understood. Instead the people wanted free food, healing, and the association of being with the miracle worker. Even his close knit and hand chosen twelve disciples fought over who was the greatest and should sit at the left and right hand of Jesus. Jesus provides us with a model to follow, a model to emulate, a model to show to others in our daily lives. President Finch called for approval of the previous council meeting minutes. A motion to approve the October 11, 2021 council meeting minutes was offered by Laurie Koestner, seconded by Kathy Meller, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch called on Council Treasurer Kay Pascoe to give the treasurers report, and copies of said report were distributed to council members. Following the report, President Finch called for a motion to approve the treasurers report. A motion to approve the report was offered by Jana Thompson, seconded by Delores Vlach, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch then called on Pastor David for his report. Per activity report, Pastor David reports no mileage for the month of October 2021.

Pastor David reported the following activities for October 2021: Worship and Music meeting, Lohman City Council meeting, Church Council, S.T.A.R.S., Lions Club, Freundschaft Gruppe, Mutual Ministry and Ministerial Alliance. Pastor performed one office counseling visit, one emergency room visit, and one office visit with Laurie Koestner for Christmas Play discussion.

Pastor held five services for October, two communion Sunday worship services in person and online with Facebook Live, and three non-communion services in person and online with Facebook Live. Pastor emailed worship bulletins, updated website with bulletin and video services, posted a daily photo with Bible verse and message on Church Facebook, created, and emailed the November Epistle. He created a list of hymn choices for Worship and Music, participated in S.T.A.R.S. gathering to help with flu shots (copy medical cards), one wedding rehearsal, performed the wedding for Makayla Stubinger and Harley Enowski, attended Kyle Freiner's Eagle Scout ceremony, and participated in Trunk or Treat.

President Finch then called for the committee reports.

Evangelism: Delores Vlach wishes to thank Debbie Boyce for her wonderful baked oatmeal, fruit, donuts and drinks for the November Fellowship hour. She also offered a big thank you to all who participated in and provided and served food for the Fellowship hours in 2021. Council discussed improved signage to announce Trunk or Treat. A suggestion was made by Jana Thompson that we consider starting and ending Trunk or Treat a little earlier so as to allow children to get home earlier on a school night. There were 14 cars and about 50 children in attendance for this event. Kathy Meller reported the chili supper donations were approximately \$4,000.00.

Technology: Dan Tschirgi, absent. President Finch reports Dan is working on improved audio at the podium near the altar.

Worship and Music: Kathy Meller reports the hymns for worship were selected for December. Kathy offered a thank you to President Finch for ordering more communion cups. She reports we will continue using Setting 10 until the end of the year. Kathy reports we will be having special music during Advent. She reports all the women will be invited to sing during our annual ingathering service to be held November 21, 2021. She reports Thanksgiving service will be November 24, 2021 at 6:30 pm, Advent begins November 28, 2021 with the lighting of the Advent candle. Kathy reports our Advent dinner is set for December 12, 2021. There will be a sign up sheet in the narthex. Kathy reports Christmas Eve service will be December 24, 2021 at 6:30 pm with Holy Communion.

Parish Education: Laurie Koestner reports we have been having between two and four children in Sunday School, and we have received two volunteers to help with Sunday school. She reports our Christmas Program in entitled "Once Upon a Christmas Cheery" with rehearsals set for November 14th and 21st, December 5th, and 12th. The program will be December 19, 2021 as part of our Sunday Worship.

Church Improvement: Mitch Plochberger reports he repaired a light in our Sanctuary, and that Ameren replaced the light by the parsonage. He attended the basement remodeling meeting on October 2021. Mitch reported on the basement remodel ideas that are currently being discussed.

Stewardship and Finance: Paula Linsenbardt and Stacy Bubach. Paula presented the budget for 2022, and copies of said budget were distributed to all. Paula offered a thank you to Stacy for her help with the budget. Paula and Stacy presented items for council discussion. After much discussion, President Finch called for a motion to table the budget pending additional information on a few items. Motion was made by Paula, seconded by Laurie and passed via voice vote.

Mutual Ministry: Jana Thompson distributed copies of paid staff performance reviews /evaluations. Pastor David will email Time and Talent sheets and paper copies will be provided on Sunday, November 14, 2021. Her committee discussed the Safety and Security committee, and it was decided that this group needs to be reorganized. Jana opened the floor for discussion on ways to advertise the Blessing Box. She also reported on suggestions on ways to use our church parsonage after Pastor and Donna move to their new home.

Old Business: President Finch opened the floor for discussion on what we need to do to get our Blessing Box noticed. Several suggestions were offered, one being additional signs added below existing church signs on Route C and Route D to advertise the Blessing Box, special church events such as Trunk or Treat, and our various church suppers and events. A motion was made by Laurie Koestner to further explore ideas to improve our signs, seconded by Jana and passed via voice vote.

New Business: President Finch announced the annual reports are due December 17, 2021. She reports the Annual Meeting will be January 16, 2022.

President Finch called for a motion to adjourn. A motion was made by Kathy Meller, and passed via voice vote. Meeting adjourned at 8:00pm. Pastor closed the meeting with The Lord's Prayer.
