Ask the Pastor

Question: How can we really know God?

Answer: "Thus says the Lord: "Let not the wise man boast in his wisdom, let not the mighty man boast in his might, let not the rich man boast in his riches, but let him who boasts boast in this, that he understands and knows me, that I am the Lord who practices steadfast love, justice, and righteousness in the earth. For in these things I delight, declares the Lord." Jeremiah 9:23-24

We know about God through reading the Holy Scriptures. The Jeremiah scripture above tells us what God is all about, namely love, justice, and righteousness. As we read through the Bible we find in both the Old and New testaments what God expects of us.

We are to have no others gods. Exodus 20:3. We are to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength and love our neighbors in the same way we love our self. Mark 12:30-31.

"Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream." Amos 5:24 There are many verses in our Bible that tell us about God and the relationship we should be having with him and in turn with each other. But that is not the question. There is a difference in knowing about, God and knowing God.

Valentine's Day is coming up in a couple of weeks on February 14th. It is a day we express our love for others in our lives and especially our spouse, or significant other that we love. We would not buy a Valentine's card that says, "You are six feet tall, weigh 190 pounds, and have brown eyes." The card would certainly show we know about the person but that information can be found on a driver's license and a person reading it would still not 'know' the person.

So, how can we really 'KNOW' God?

Similar to the spouse or significant other, it is more than reading statistics or even scriptures. Knowing God is found in the heart as much if not more than in the mind. Knowing God is found in a relationship with him. It is the feeling of love we experience when we watch the beauty of the sunrise in the early morning hours and know God is in that wondrous light and he will be with us throughout the day. Knowing God is the feeling of comfort and peace we experience during times of conflict and even sorrow when we feel the assurance in our hearts that God loves us and has not left us alone. Knowing God is the feeling of joy we experience when we see right triumph over wrong in the world. Justice prevails in setting someone or something free when they or it has been falsely accused and oppressed. When the truth shines bright and overcomes the darkness of the lies of the world, we see and know God has won another victory for our sake and the sake of others.

We know God in our heart of hearts when we witness the righteousness of virtue and morality conquer the temptations and whispers of deceit the world uses to turn us aside.

We know God in the real life moments of drawing close to him in ways that declare, 'God is with us.' When we go to church to worship God, we feel his presence in our soul as we sing hymns together in praise of his goodness. As we walk up the aisle to the front of the sanctuary to receive the body and blood of Christ in Holy Communion, God is there. God is present in the body and blood as we commune with him and in him and he in us.

We know God in his steadfast love, justice, and righteousness that overcomes hate, injustice and wickedness for our sake. In these ways, we know God and we know he is in us and we are in him.

Our heart cannot explain God's ways and his presence with us. Our heart cannot reason through mathematical equations or scientific formula to help us know God. We can only truly know God when we completely open our heart to him in prayer, and listening for his response through the Holy Spirit guiding us in ways of steadfast love, justice, and righteousness.

Annual Congregational Meeting, January 16, 2022 Respectfully submitted by Becky Weber

The Annual Congregational Meeting was called to order at 10:05am by Council President Zola Finch. Council members present were President Finch, Delores Vlach, Kathy Meller, Mitch Plochberger, Laurie Koestner, Dan Tschirgi and Becky Weber. Also present were Pastor David Viles and church treasurer Kay Pascoe. The 2022 Annual meeting was held via in person for council members, and church members, and per online attendance via FaceBook live.

The President called upon Pastor David Viles to offer an opening prayer. Pastor Viles gave a prayer for all in attendance.

Attendance was registered by forty people per sign in sheet, and two people per individual notification via FaceBook online. The total of in person and online attendance is forty-two, thus the required quorum was met.

The President asked for congregational approval of the minutes of the January 17, 2021 Congregational Meeting as printed in the Congregational Annual Meeting Report, page 2. A motion to approve the January 17, 2021 minutes was put forth by Jerry Koestner, seconded by Kent Nelson, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch asked Pastor Viles to present his report of the past year of his service to St. Paul's church. Pastor Viles informed the congregation of his upcoming move into the home previously owned by Hugo and Gert Strobel following completion of its renovation. He then reported on his activities and referenced his report as printed in the Annual Report, page 7.

President Finch reported the Mutual Ministry committee updated the Church Handbook. She noted the addition of the Blessing Box located atop the church hill. President Finch referred attendees to the Presidents report, page 5, and the committee reports as printed in the Annual Report.

President Finch called on Jerry Koestner for the Audit Committee report. Jerry reported the financial audit was in order, and commended Kay Pascoe on her meticulous attention to detail with regards to the treasurer's records and reports. President Finch called for any discussion or questions. Seeing that there were no questions, discussion or opposition voiced/noted, she called for a motion to accept the Financial audit committee report. Motion was offered by Richard Heidbreder, seconded by Donald Weber and passed via voice vote

Old Business: Safety and Security: Jerry Koestner. Jerry reports that his committee is looking into replacing the wood doors with metal doors along the side of the church. He also reports that these doors are locked just prior to the beginning of the service. His committee will continue to meet to discuss changes needed for improved security, to include security cameras for our church.

New Business: President Finch reported on the generous donation from the Hugo and Gert Strobel estate of \$96,000.00, with no specific designation, and thus to be put into the church general revenue fund. Frank Pascoe made the recommendation that church council members discuss possibly donating ten percent of this donation to a local charity or a designated charity. Church council will discuss this further.

President Finch called upon the Nominating Committee member Becky Weber to report on elections. Becky Weber reported on the nomination of Stacy Bubach to fill one of two vacancies on the church council. She thanked Stacy for considering this nomination. Becky then asked for any nominations from the floor to fill the second vacancy, that of council secretary. Seeing there were no nominations, she

called for a motion to approve Stacy Bubach for church council. A motion to approve was made by Gus Fischer, seconded by Kathryn Linsenbardt, and passed via voice vote.

President Finch informed Dan Tschirgi to keep her posted of any online questions and comments put forth by FaceBook attendees. Dan informed her that one attendee was unable to hear the suggestion put forth by Frank Pascoe concerning the donation by the Strobel estate. President Finch then repeated this aforementioned suggestion per Frank Pascoe.

President Finch referred attendees to the financial report and budget as per Annual Report (see pages 26 and 27.) She then called for any questions or discussion of such. Seeing that there was none, she put forth a request for a motion to approve the 2022 budget. Motion to approve was put forth by Jason Plochberger, seconded by Laurie Koestner and passed via voice vote.

President Finch reported on church council discussion and decision that the upcoming vacated church parsonage be used as a church annex, for church meetings, youth group gatherings, etc. President Finch reports we will keep the utilities on following Pastor's vacating the parsonage, and that guidelines will be established for its use.

President Finch called on Mitch Plochberger to give a report on the kitchen renovation. Mitch reports the committee to remodel the kitchen will continue periodic meetings to organize and plan the renovation.

President Finch offered her appreciation to Pastor David for his leadership and willingness to continue to serve our church family, the church staff, the church volunteers, church council members, and outgoing council members.

President Finch called for any other business. Seeing no further business, she made a motion to adjourn. A motion to adjourn was made by Kent Nelson, seconded by Gary Bunch and passed via voice vote.

The President declared the 2022 Congregational Annual meeting adjourned at 10:20am. Pastor Viles closed the meeting with a prayer.

After the Annual Meeting, a church council meeting was held. Frank Pascoe has graciously agreed to serve as the new council secretary. It was mutually decided council members will continue to serve on the same committees. After a brief discussion, council members will revisit possible charities for the ten percent of the Hugo and Gert Strobel estate donation.
