Pastor's Message

"Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others."

Philippians 2:4

"Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God."

Hebrews 13:16

"Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

Galatians 6:2

These are three of many, many, verses in scripture telling us to help others. Jesus sums this up with his command to "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

So, how do we love one another? By helping others in need as we would want to be helped if we were in need.

Last month was filled with tragedy. The war in Ukraine continues past the third month. The country has been devastated by bombing and artillery shelling. These are not only soldiers fighting soldiers. All of Ukraine's population has been affected. Hospitals are targeted as are schools, even kindergartens and preschools. The most vulnerable are killed. Cities and housing areas are demolished leaving millions of civilians to become refugees or killed. The reaction of the world's nations has been to create economic hardships for Russia. Very little in comparison has been done to help the Ukrainian forces battle Russia. But, we have prayed for them.

On May 24, 2022, an eighteen year old entered Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas with weapons and a lot of ammunition. He began shooting eleven-year-old fourth graders and two teachers. Heavily armed law enforcement officers waited over an hour to engage the gunman. During that time he killed 19 children and two teachers and wounded others. But, we have prayed for them.

Jesus calls us to pray for each other, and he gave us the example of praying often.

But, Jesus did something else. He personally touched the lepers and healed them. He fed the hungry, gave sight to the blind, made the lame walk, and even raised the dead. He gave us an example to act. Prayer is a wonderful act of love and I am a believer in the effects of prayer. I have witnessed the impact of God's love and compassion through prayer.

But, praying to God is more than asking God to do something on behalf of yourself or for someone else. When you pray for yourself or someone else, pray for God to give you the wisdom and knowledge to do his will in loving another as Jesus loves you. The example Jesus gave us is to pray and then to use our hands to touch, feed, and help as we are able.

Ask the Pastor

Question: Why isn't there more emphasis in Church for Ascension Day of our Lord?

Answer: Hmmm, great question!



The Ascension of our Lord, Jesus the Christ, is the day he publicly and visually ascends (goes to) the kingdom of God, or what we call Heaven.

We profess our faith each Sunday when we say in the Apostle's Creed; "On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead."

The ascension happened forty days after Jesus was risen from the tomb, after he had been crucified for our sake.

This is ten days before Pentecost Sunday, the first Sunday of June when we hear the how the Apostles will receive the Holy Spirit as Jesus had told them.

This was once a common day of worship for many Christians of different faith practices. It was once an important day of worship called, Feast of the Ascension of Jesus Christ, also called Ascension Day, Ascension Thursday, and sometimes Holy Thursday.

It is important as it is the continued witness of Jesus resurrection, and just as importantly, it is the beginning of the Apostles going out into the world to share the good news of Jesus' resurrection as Jesus commands. The story is found in the first chapter of Acts and Jesus tells them, "you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

So, to the question of why this day does not have the emphasis in the Church as it once did. The emphasis has probably been lost due to the fact it is celebrated on a Thursday, which is always 40 days after Easter Sunday. Unfortunately, the world pulls us away with temptations of what we should want which doesn't include worship of God. The world tells us we only need to worship God for an hour a week. Some churches have moved the day of ascension to Sunday, which solves the conflict.

Go out this day and remember Jesus' Ascension.

Congregational Council Meeting, May 9, 2022 **Respectfully submitted by Frank Pascoe**

† A regular monthly meeting of St. Paul's Church Council was called to order at 6:08 PM by President Zola Finch. Present were members Stacy Bubach, Jana Thompson, Kathy Meller, Delores Vlach, Mitch Plochberger, Laurie Koestner, and Frank Pascoe. Absent was Dan Tschirgi. Also present were Pastor David Viles and Church Treasurer Kay Pascoe.

† The meeting began with a prayer and devotion by Pastor Viles. Pastor's devotion was an interesting story entitled "Three Pieces of Advice – Man's Wise Choice". A story which taught us: 1. Never take shortcuts in your life. Shorter or unknown paths can cost your life. 2. Never be too curious, for curiosity towards evil can be deadly. 3. Never make decisions in moments of anger or pain because when you repent it could be too late."

† The President called for approval of the previous Council minutes which had been distributed to all members after the April meeting. This was agreed to upon a motion offered by Kathy Meller, seconded by Laurie Koestner, and approved via voice.

† The President called upon Church Treasurer Kay Pascoe to present the Church's current monthly financial statement. Kay presented a four-page analysis of current spending and income. Various questions concerning the month's details were entertained and responded to by the Treasurer.

† The President called upon Pastor Viles to present his April report. Pastor requested no mileage reimbursement for April. His Pastoral report detailed eight meetings with various internal and external groups. His ministerial activities included three baptisms, preparation of eight service bulletins, as well as the April Epistle.

President Finch called upon the various Committee Chairpersons to present their monthly reports:

Evangelism: Chairperson Delores Vlach thanked Donita Stubinger and family and WELCA for hosting the recent fellowship coffee with their tasty breakfast of biscuits and gravy, scrambled eggs, muffins, fruit and juices. Delores announced an upcoming May 22d event will celebrate the Church's graduating students from High School and College. Cards will be sent to all.

Technology: President Finch reported that parishioner Bill Gerth has volunteered to assist with the Sunday soundboard system as needed. She also reported that Technology Chairman Dan Tschirgi has said that no sales have taken place as hoped for the outdated soundboard equipment. It will be decided later to sell, discard or donate, if possible, the items of equipment.

Worship & Music: Chairperson Kathy Meller reported no committee meeting was held in April. Pastor Viles sent out the hymn choices for June, as did some other committee members. Kathy said she was highly pleased with the various Lenten services and especially the one with the baptisms. Setting Eight in the hymnal has been chosen for the upcoming Pentecost season. Pentecost begins on June 5th. A short cemetery service will be held there on Memorial Day, May 29th. Flags will celebrate the graves of our various veterans.

Parish Education: Chairperson Laurie Koestner reported her pleasure at the Easter Day activities. The Easter Egg hunt event was especially well enjoyed with high attendance of the children on that Sunday. Laurie reported that the regular Sunday School has been little attended in recent weeks. Fall opening of a new Sunday school year is currently being planned.

Church Improvement: Chairman Mitch Plochberger reported that the order for the new doors has gone forward. No specific delivery day is currently known. Council members discussed possible ways and methods of disposing of the old doors. No decision was made at this time. Mitch reported that he has delayed for the moment window replacement orders because additional measurement decisions must be decided. Several questions were raised regarding the proposed updating and renovation of the Kitchen. The Council members briefly entertained various ideas for funding the proposed kitchen renovation, and the bids for it going forward.

Stewardship & Finance: Chair Stacy Bubach indicated the need to obtain information and procedural details from the Church's Financial Recording Secretary Marie Schepeler on her methods for recording collections and financial donations. This information is needed in an ongoing effort to provide adequate and continuing backup for this process. President Finch suggested we might prepare a "Financial Manual" to detail all financial record keeping. Stacy will move forward on gaining this information from the Financial Recording Secretary and from the Church Treasurer as well. A motion was made to designate Council President Zola Finch as a signer of routine church cheques when the Church Treasurer, Kay Pascoe, is unavailable to do so. This motion was made by Stacy Bubach, seconded by Laurie Koestner, and passed unanimously.

Mutual Ministry: Chairperson Jana Thompson reported no April committee meeting. She reported that efforts are ongoing to get local area businesses and institutions to advertise our Blessing Box. Pastor Viles reported that the use of the Blessing Box continues to be at a very good level. Marie Schepeler has helped keep its contents up to date. There is a need for infant items and especially diapers. The Council discussed various ways we might obtain these needed items. A note will be

placed in some Sunday Bulletins to urge our parishioners to donate these needed items to keep the Blessing Box at capacity. President Finch suggested we might contact and work with the Mid-Missouri Diaper Bank for information.

Old Business: President Finch thanked parishioner Becky Weber for her ongoing work on an area Resource Guide. The Church Secretary has typed up the latest version and proof copies were shown to the Council members. This will be made available shortly for distribution among our congregation and in local situations.

New Business: The Council discussed at some length issues with the upcoming new security system and the necessity for new church entrance keys to replace those presently held. When locked, entering the Church will require access to the security code to silence the alarm system. How this is to be accomplished needs to be addressed.

At the meeting the members were made aware by Pastor Viles of the need to make strangers visiting the Church grounds at odd hours of their being noted and recorded on security cameras. This came about in a recent occurrence of an evening visit by a couple visiting the grounds and cemetery in a rather mischievous attitude. The Council discussed the need for a sign to be placed in a prominent location to make strangers aware of the security cameras and their being filmed. Pastor's safety was an expressed concern of Council members. No decision was made at this time on a specific location of the needed sign.

President Finch called the meeting at an end at 7:25 PM. Pastor Viles led the Council in a recitation of the Our Father.

Women of the ELCA Mid-Missouri Spring Cluster Meeting 4/30/022— Erika Gerth

On a rainy Saturday morning in late April, Donita Stubinger, Marie Scheperle, Donna Viles, Trish Russell and Erika Gerth set out for Stover, MO to attend the Mid-Missouri Spring Cluster Meeting at Trinity Lutheran Church, Pymont.

Donita drove, Marie navigated, the rain dissipated and our attention was drawn to the lush Amish countryside including the horse drawn carriages and their drivers. An hour later we arrived at our destination, a charming church, complete with its own cemetery (made us feel right at home!) and an adjacent fellowship hall in which our meeting took place.

Prior to the morning's agenda we enjoyed coffee, fruit and cinnamon rolls. Gladys Moll's cheerful "Welcome to the country!" was an appropriate greeting considering the church's beautiful rural surroundings! She commented that throughout church history, women gathered for fellowship, worship, Bible study and mission, just as Women of the ELCA do today.

The morning's Bible study, based on the story of the Good Samaritan, told of a young mother with five children who was in desperate need of assistance.

Several people paid no attention to her plight, and as was the case with the injured man in Luke's gospel, this mom's help came from a very unlikely source.

We were privileged to hear Dillon Yelton, Executive Administrator of the Segrada Scholarship Bible Camp, share the history of the camp and its mission. Camp Segrada is located at Lake of the Ozarks near Lincoln, MO. It was established in 1997 to serve children of incarcerated parents as well as kids identified as high-risk, thanks to collaboration with Angel Tree Ministries and Chuck Colson's Prison

Fellowship Ministry. The camp is funded entirely by donations from churches and individuals and has only four paid staff. Individuals, some of whom had themselves been campers at Segrada, volunteer their time as camp counselors. Each camper receives a Bible and faith formation is an important aspect of the camping experience, which is totally free to the young person.

Forty-one women representing eleven churches in the Mid-Missouri Cluster brought numerous items for which Segrada Camp had expressed a need. Upon departure, the Yelton's truck was filled with paper towels, cleaning supplies, disinfecting wipes, batteries, laundry detergent, dryer sheets, paper napkins, brooms, dustpans and so much more!

Lunch provided not only a delicious meal but also time to reconnect with friends not seen in the past months. Soon we were called together for the traditional after-lunch hymn sing, which focused on songs dealing with the beauty of creation and especially flowers. This group of forty-one women definitely made a joyful noise unto the Lord which, in this writer's opinion, rivaled choirs found in much larger churches!

During the business meeting we learned about the upcoming 34th Annual Convention of the Central States Synodical Women of the ELCA to be held July 22-24, 2022 in Overland Park, KS. The day's offering totaled \$650.00 of which Segrada Scholarship Camp received \$325.00. The remaining \$325.00 was sent to the Central States Women of the ELCA to support its work in providing numerous resources for spiritual growth including on-line Bible studies, newsletters, and scholarships for those wishing to attend synodical conventions and so much more.

All agreed that this was a very meaningful event and we look forward to the fall cluster meeting scheduled for September 24, 2022 at Christ and Trinity Lutheran Church in Sedalia. Mark your calendars, Ladies, and plan to attend - you will be glad you did!
